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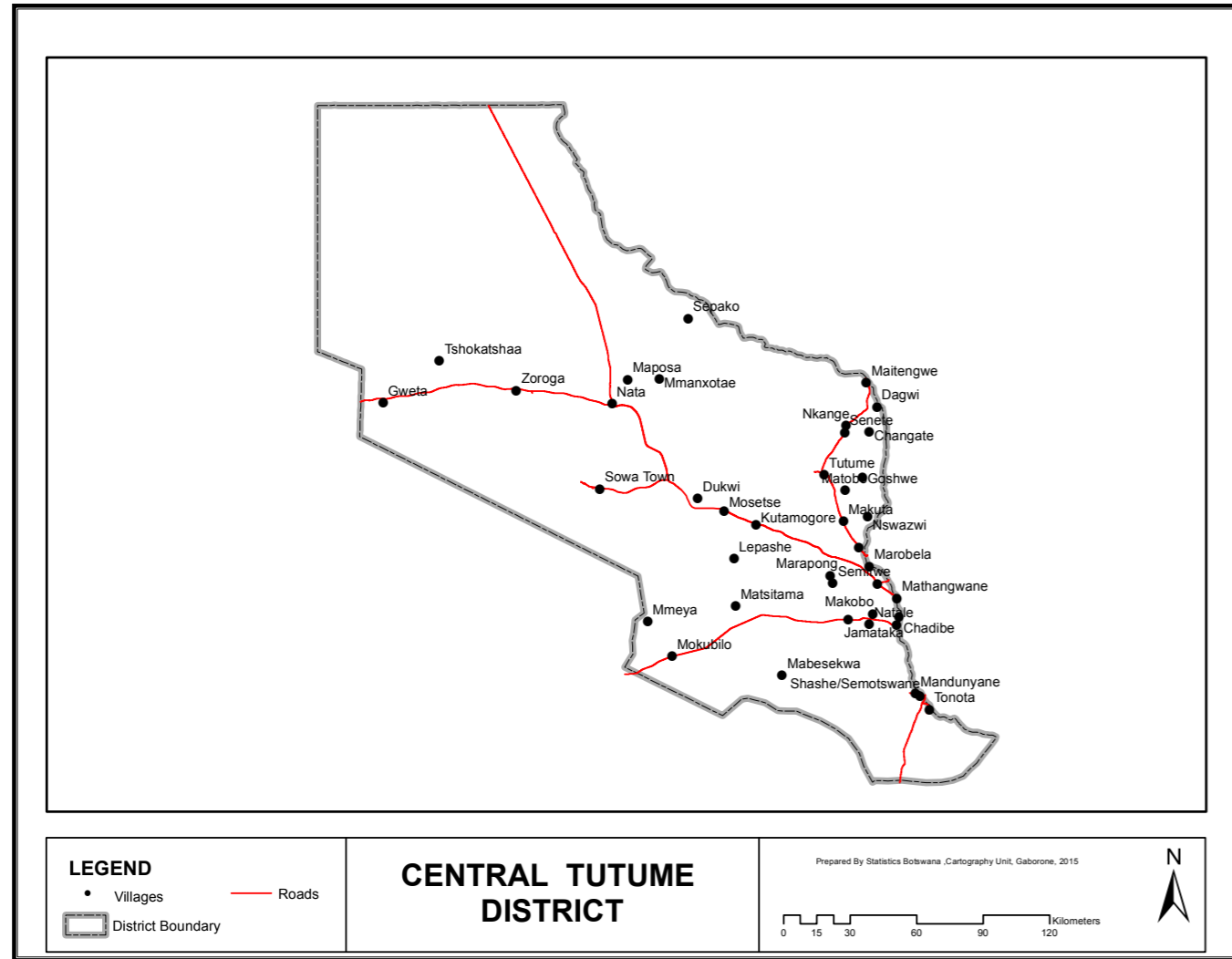
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Figure 1: Map of Central Tutume District

## 1.0 Background and Commentary

The Population and Housing Census is the most representative form of enumeration since it covers as many people and variables as possible. It is the total enumeration of households throughout the country. The census is carried out after every ten (10) years in Botswana. This report covers indicators and counts of the 2011 census and makes comparisons, in some instances, with the previous census of 2001. There are two types of enumeration methods. One is the De Jure type and the other is the De Facto. The De Jure method refers to the enumeration of population according to usual residence. It excludes visitors but includes absent residents. The De Facto method, on the other hand, refers to the enumeration of population according to where one spent the census night, It includes visitors but excludes absent residents.

The 2011 Population and Housing Census used the De Facto enumeration. An important aspect of the 2011 census is its wide disaggregation of information by important variables of sex, gender and locality, among others. The disaggregation forms the basis of this report. The report presents information on localities of 500 or more inhabitants.

### 1.1 Background to the Report

This report was necessitated by the need for disaggregated data at all levels. Statistics Botswana, with the assistance of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), undertook work on producing geographically disaggregated and gender sensitive information.

### 1.2 Importance of the Report

Demographic and socio-demographic information is critical in the development efforts of a country. The tendency has been to produce national averages to represent the situation of all people within the country. Hence, data at the district and locality level have not been fully published and used by the localities even when available. This masked the wide disparities in demographic, health and other socio-economic indicators within the country. The outlook of these have, therefore, been overlooked hence conditions of large sections of the communities have remained largely unknown.

## 2.0 Total Population and growth

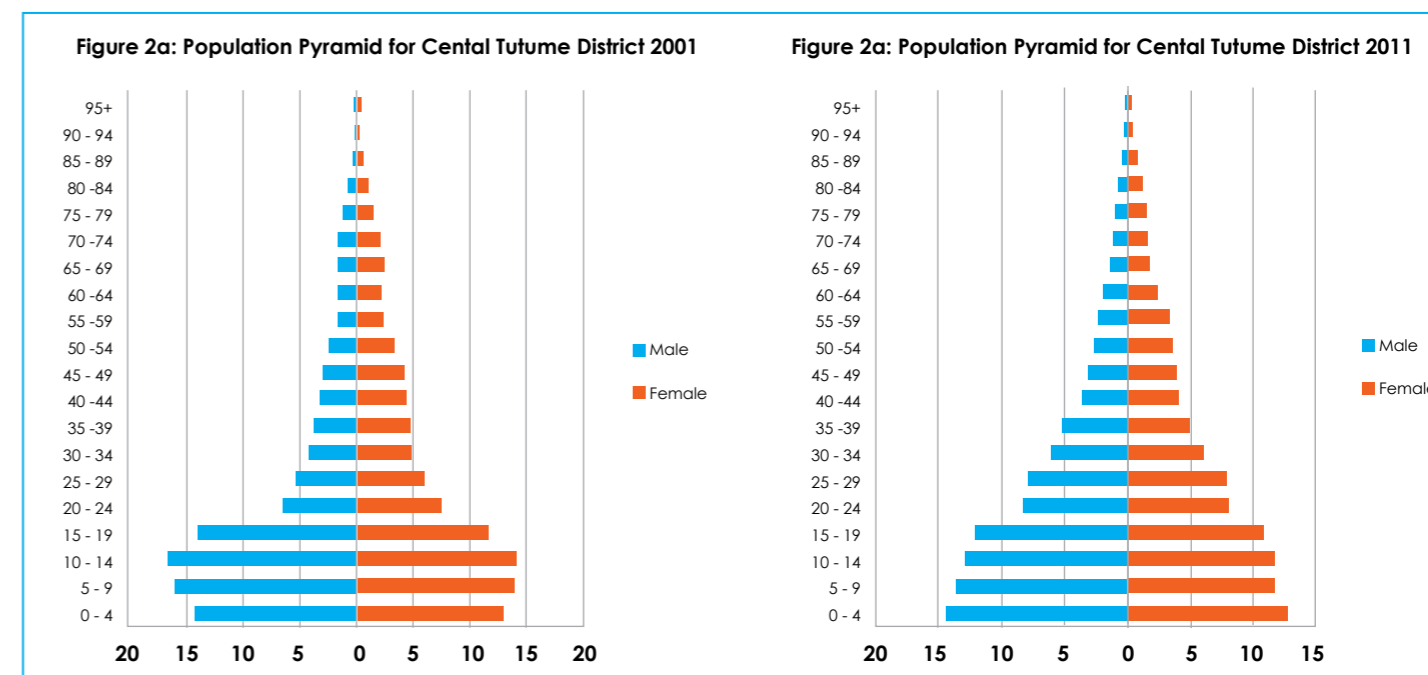
The 2011 Population and Housing Census estimated the total sub district population at 147,377. This was an increase of 19.3 percent from the 2001 count of 123,514. The increase represented an annual increment of 1.9 percent as indicated in Table 1. That is, between 2001 and 2011, the district population was growing by 1.9 percent every year. The district is headquartered in the village of Tutume, which contributes 12.4 percent of the total sub district population. The village grew by an estimated 24.4 percent between 2001 and 2011.

The highest growth was recorded in the villages of Chadibe at 229.0 percent, and Borolong at 71.0 percent. Other villages which recorded significant growth over the period were Manxotae at 53.9 percent and Nata at 50.7 percent. On the other hand, some villages lost population between 2001 and 2011. These included Marobela, which lost 38.8 percent of its population and Dagwi which went down by 28.2 percent. Other villages which recorded net loss of population were Matobo at minus 20.1 percent, Matsitama, which lost 16.8 percent of its 2001 population. Reasons for the net loss can be attributed to the fact that villages outlined above do not have significant economic activities and job opportunities, thereby experiencing a net outmigration of population mainly for job opportunities elsewhere.

## 3.0 Population Composition

Just like the rest of the country, the district has a youthful population. Infants aged a year and below made up 5.6 percent of the sub district population, while those aged less than five years made 13.7 percent.

The distributions in the above pictures show a broad base denoting a high proportion of infants and children up to the age of 19. These are children and youths of school going age up to senior secondary level. After the age of 19, there is a marked reduction of youth in the ages 20 years and above. The age cohort represents mobile population which may have moved to other centres in search of jobs and better opportunities for self-improvement.

### 3.1 Labour Force

Labour force is defined as the population aged 15 to 64 years regardless of whether they are currently engaged in any economic activity or not. This population constituted 54.6 percent of the sub district's population. Nata village had the highest percentage of persons in this age bracket at 61.3 percent followed by Tonota at 59.9 percent. The villages of Tshokatshaa and Dagwi had the lowest percentage of people within the labour force bracket at 44.0 percent and 40.5 percent respectively.

### 3.2 The Youth

The youth are described as those aged between 18 and 35 years. This group made up 27.3 percent of the sub district's population. Moseitse village had the highest proportion of youths at 34.1 percent, followed by Matsitama at 33.6 percent. Other villages with a significant proportion of youths were Borotsi at 32.9 percent and Borolong at 31.3 percent.

### 3.3 The Elderly

The elderly population refers to those who are aged 65 years and above. The group is assumed to be economically inactive. It is also classified as a dependent group. A high proportion in this age bracket presents the country with a huge dependency burden as this group has special needs, including special care and pensions, among others.

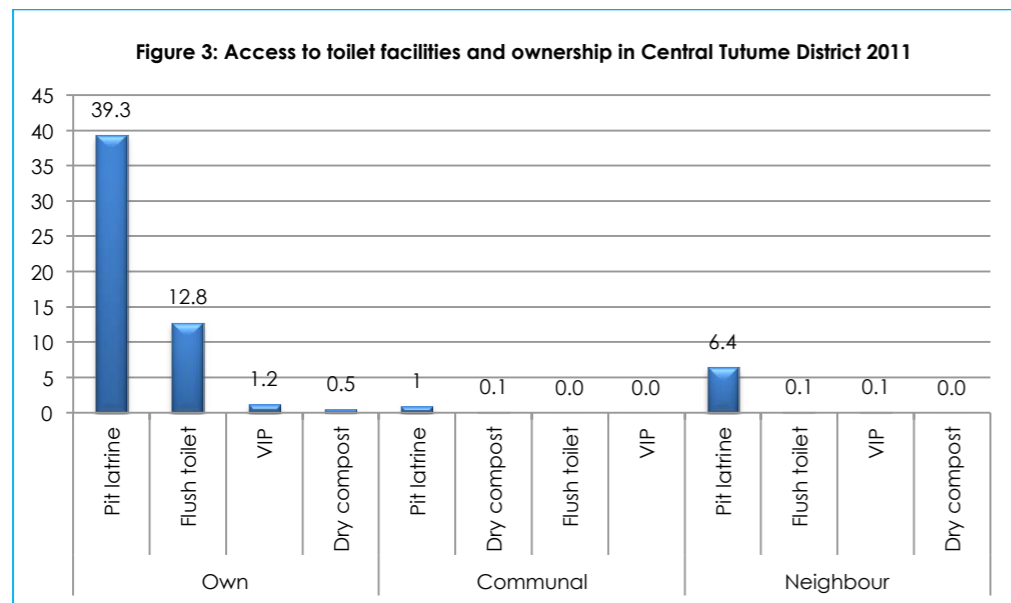
Overall, 6.3 percent of the sub district's population were the elderly. This proportion was higher than the national average of 5.5 percent. The village of Matobo had the highest proportion of the elderly population at 12.8 percent. The village was closely followed by Dagwi at 11.2 percent, and Makuta at 11.1 percent. Dukwi had the lowest percentage of the elderly population at 3.0 percent.



#### 4.0 Access to Sanitation

Access to sanitation facilities was measured at household level by assessing whether it had access to flush toilet either in-house, communal or shared with a neighbour or had access to a sanitary pit latrine. Overall, 75.8 percent of the sub district's households had access to sanitation facilities. While 12.9 percent of the district's households had access to flush toilets, 46.7 percent had access to pit latrines, out of which 39.3 percent used their own pit latrines, 6.4 percent from a neighbour and 1.0 used a communal pit latrine.

The village of Tonota had the highest proportion of households which used own flush toilets at 23.2 percent followed by Tutume at 17.8 percent (Table 5b). On the other hand, the use of pit latrines was still prevalent in most villages, including the urban village of Tonota where 16.3 percent used pit latrines.



Regarding overall access to toilet facilities, which included pit latrines, Chadibe had the highest access at 92.1 percent while Mabesekwa and Mmeya had the least access at 15.3 percent and 14.3 percent respectively.

#### 5.0 Access to Portable Water

Providing safe drinking water has been a priority for government since the early years of independence. As a signatory of the Millennium Declaration, Botswana is committed to ensuring that the majority of its population have access to improved water source. Improved water source refers to piped water indoors, outdoors, a neighbour's tap, a communal tap, a bowser or tanker and a borehole.

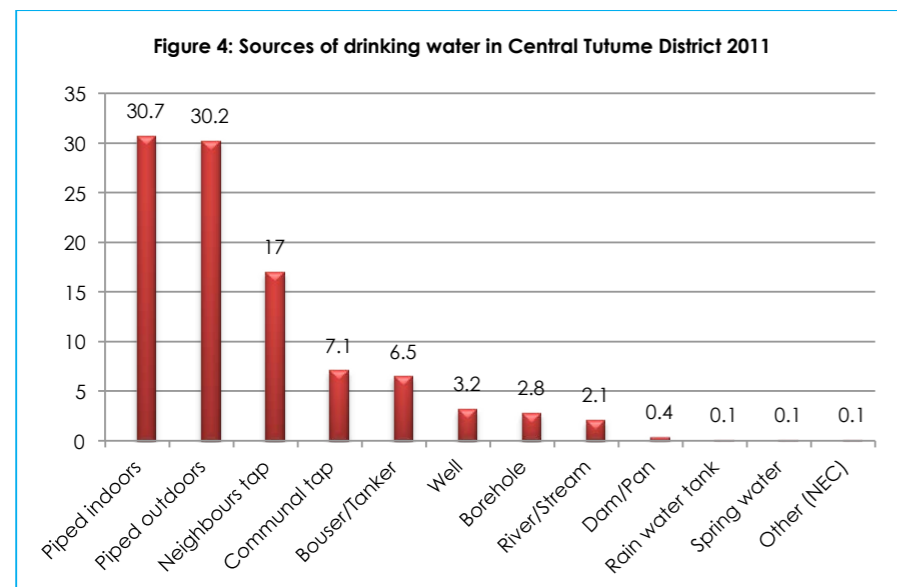


Figure 3 represents the proportion of households by type of water source for drinking. Overall, 93.1 percent of the district's households had access to water from one of the sources mentioned above. The lowest proportion of those who had access to improved water source was found in the settlement of Sepako at 80.5 percent of the households. Other villages in the district had more than 81 percent of the households with access to improved water sources.

#### 6.0 Disability

Disability may be generally defined as a condition which may restrict a person's mental, sensory, or mobility functions to undertake or perform a task in the same way as a person who does not have a disability.

The population of the sub district was assessed for its ability to see in one or two eyes, ability to hear in one or both ears, speaking, ability to use one or both legs, ability to use one or both arms and retardation. Although disability in the district was low, the most common form of disability was defects of seeing in one or both eyes as it affected 1.7 percent of the district's population. This form of disability was more prevalent in Sepako where it affected 5.4 percent of the village population. The second most common form of disability in the district was inability to hear in one or both ears. It affected 0.8 percent of the district population.

Disabilities may have far-reaching consequences at household and societal levels. These include increased need for care by the family; social relationships may be disturbed and the family structure may disintegrate; economic burdens on families may lead to poverty; low socio-economic level and low education lead to less development and lower productivity in society and the demand for care by the society/state may be increased<sup>1</sup>.

#### 7.0 Employment and Unemployment

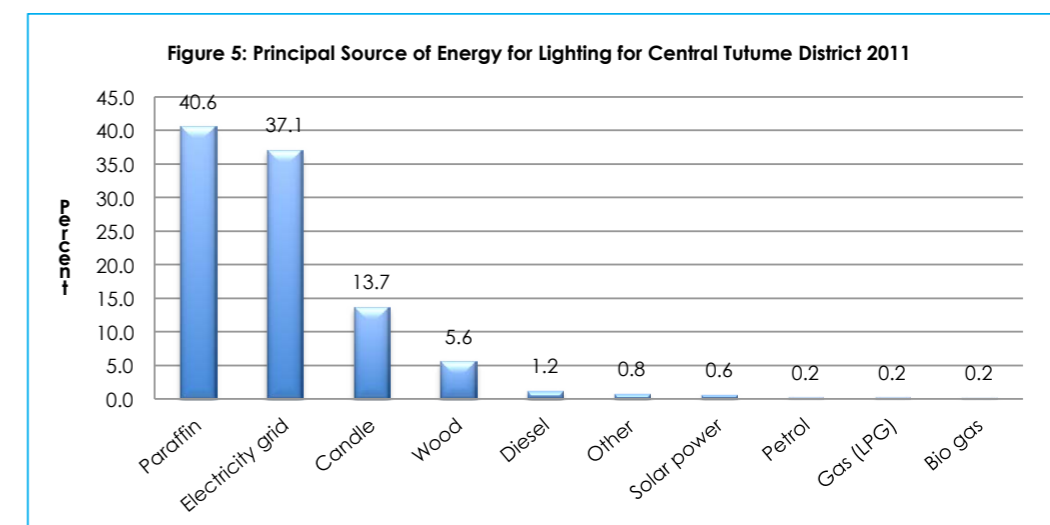
Employment was estimated for persons aged 15 years and above. The overall labour force for the district was 80,996 or 54.9 per cent of the district population. Overall unemployment for the sub district was estimated at 13.1 per cent and showed a picture not familiar to other districts where females have less unemployment rate than their male counterparts on rates of 14.6 per cent for females compared 11.8 for males.

#### 8.0 Literacy

Literacy rate was estimated for population aged 10 years and above who had completed standard four or above. Those were assumed to be literate and used to estimate literacy rate. Overall, 82.4 percent of the district's population was estimated to be literate. The highest literacy rate was estimated in Chadibe at 90.3 percent followed by Nswazi at 88.2 percent. Literacy rate was lowest in Mabesekwa and Mmeya at 64.9 percent and 64.8 percent respectively.

#### 9.0 Source of Fuel for Lighting

Figure 5 shows that paraffin and electricity were the leading sources of energy for lighting for more than 77.7 percent of the district's households. Paraffin was the leading source as it was used by 40.6 percent of the households followed by electricity at 37.1 percent.



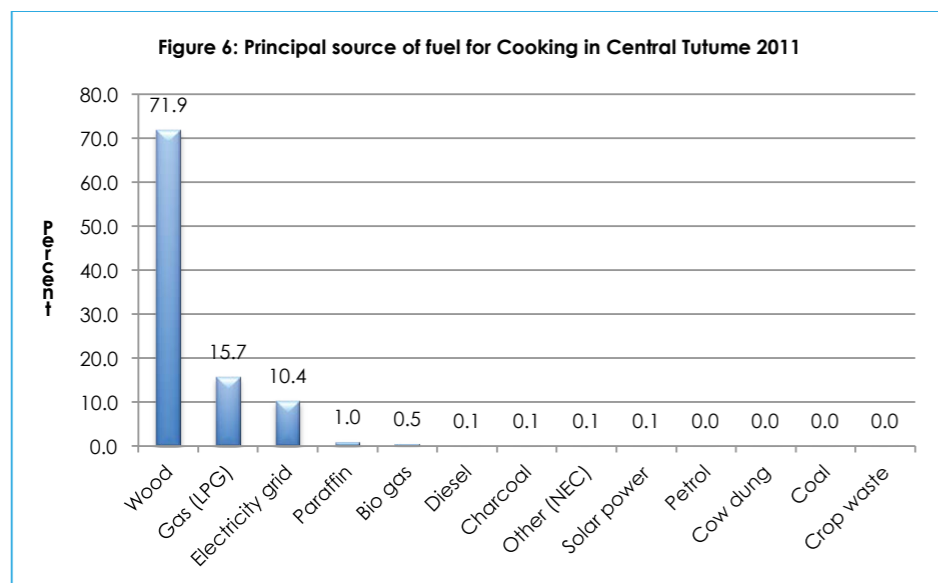
The largest proportion of those who used electricity for lighting was found in Borolong at 63.0 percent followed by Chadibe, Tonota and Mathangwane at 54.8 percent, 53.9 percent and 48.5 percent respectively.

The most common source of fuel for lighting in the district was paraffin, which was used by 40.6 percent of the households. The data shows that paraffin was used in villages where connection to the electricity grid was limited. A significant proportion (13.7 percent) of the district's households used candle for lighting.

### 10.0 Source of Fuel for Cooking

Cooking energy accounts for about 90 percent of all household energy consumption in developing countries. Worldwide, 2.5 billion people use biomass fuels for cooking. These include firewood, charcoal, dung and agricultural residues. Biomass fuels are often the only available energy source, especially in rural areas. In most Sub-Saharan countries, more than 80 per cent of the population use biomass fuels for their daily cooking<sup>2</sup>.

Figure 6 below shows that in Botswana, wood is by far the most used source of energy for household cooking. It was used by 71.9 percent of households in the district. The use of wood was followed by that of gas (LPG) and electricity at 15.7 percent and 10.4 percent respectively. The use of firewood for cooking was highest in rural villages where other alternatives are limited.



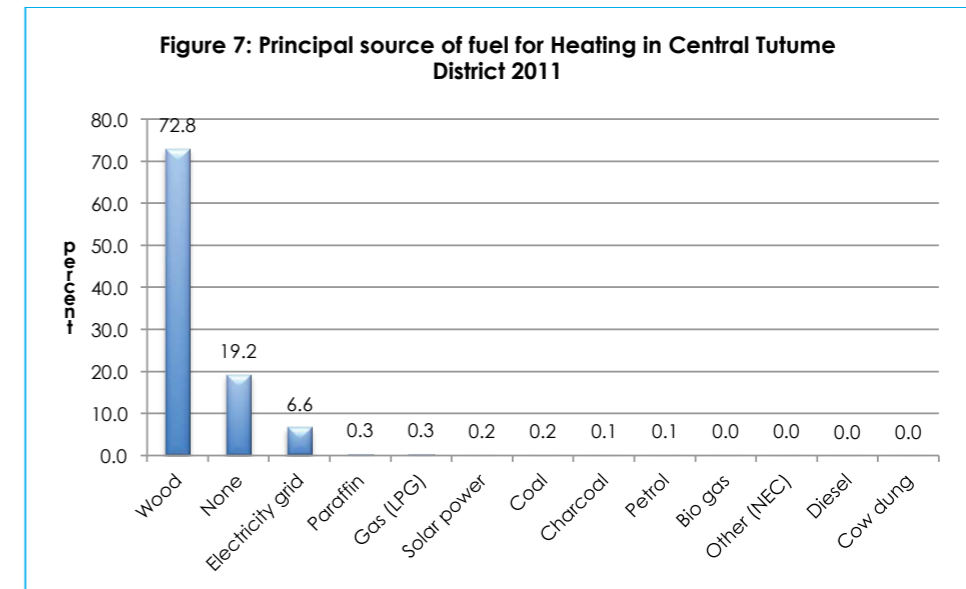
With a growing population, the demand for gas may far exceed sustainable supply which will lead to massive deforestation, land degradation and desertification.

### 11.0 Source of Fuel for Heating

In a home the heating system normally serves two purposes. The primary purpose of heating is to maintain warm temperatures within the home during colder months. Keeping a house warm is important for the occupants of the home as well as the structure itself. The secondary purpose of a heating system is to heat domestic water for usage during all months of the year.

Figure 7 shows that wood is by far the most common fuel used for domestic or household heating. A similar trend is observed in principal source of fuel for cooking. It was used by 90.1 percent of the district's households for heating. The proportion of those who used wood for heating was high for both rural and urban villages. For example, the urban village of Borolong, which had the lowest proportion of households using wood for heating still, had 81.2 percent of its households using firewood for heating.

The use of firewood was followed by that of electricity at 8.2 percent. Borolong had the highest proportion of households using electricity for heating at 16.0 percent followed by Tonota and Moseitse at 13.6 percent and 12.7 percent respectively.



### 12.0 Religion

A religion is defined as an organised collection of beliefs, cultural systems, and world views that relate humanity to an order of existence. Other scholars define religion as a collection of cultural systems, belief systems, and worldviews that establishes symbols that relate humanity to spirituality and, sometimes, to moral values<sup>3</sup>.

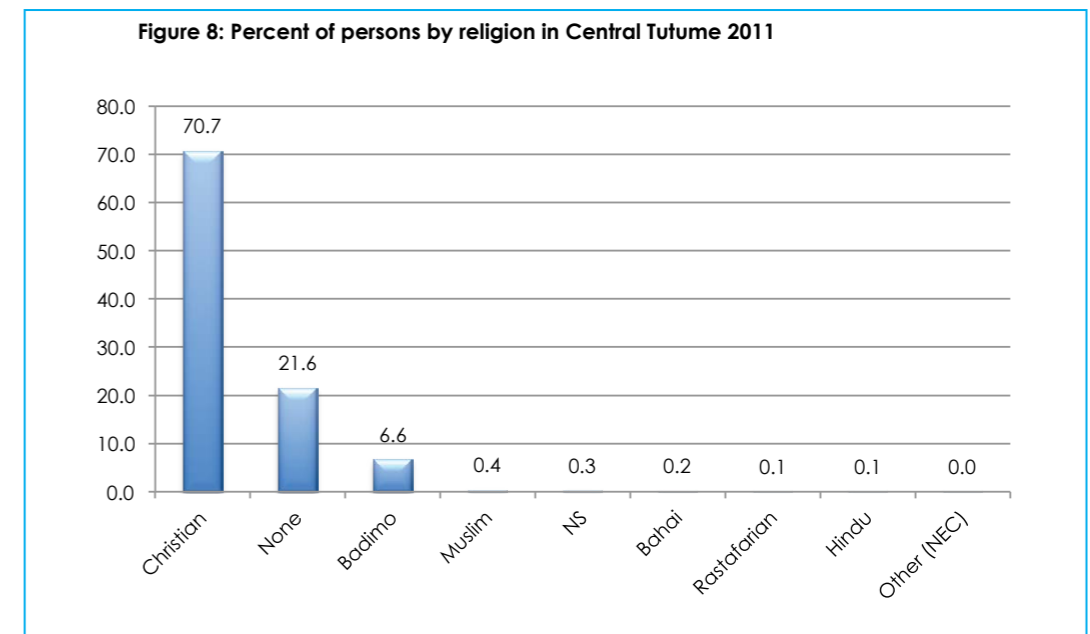


Figure 8 shows that Christianity was the most followed religion with 70.7 percent of the district's population reportedly following the denomination. A significant 21.6 percent of the district population reported not following any religion and a further 6.6 percent followed Badimo.

### 13.0 Marital Status

Marital status was asked for persons aged 12 years and above. That is, whether they were in any union at the time of the census. Although the country's legal age of marriage is 18 years, there are still cultures where young girls are married at ages below that, some as young as 12. One purpose of marriage is to create a stable home in which children can grow and thrive.

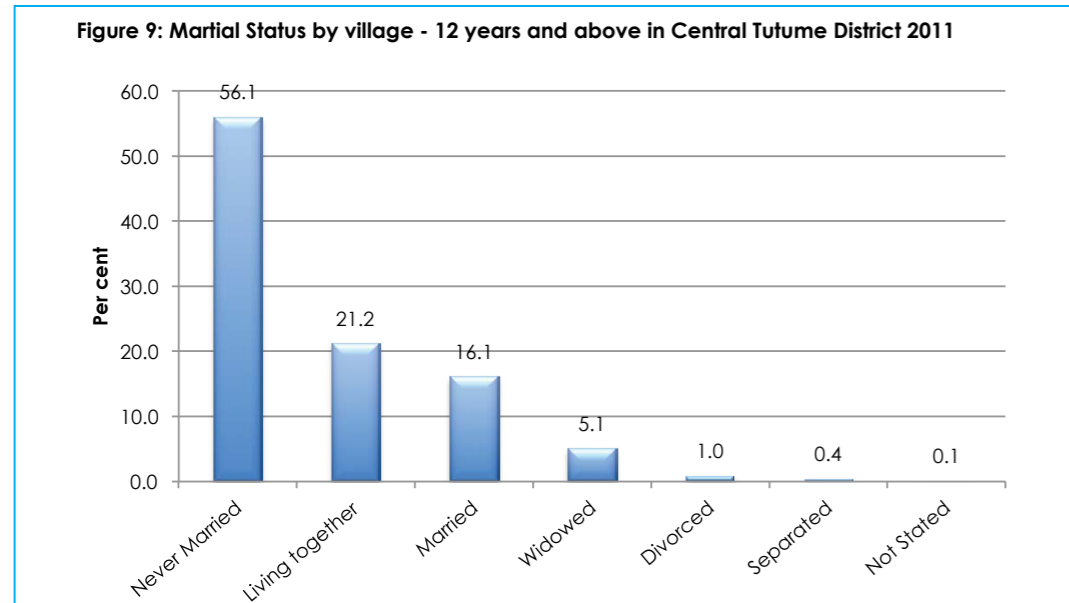
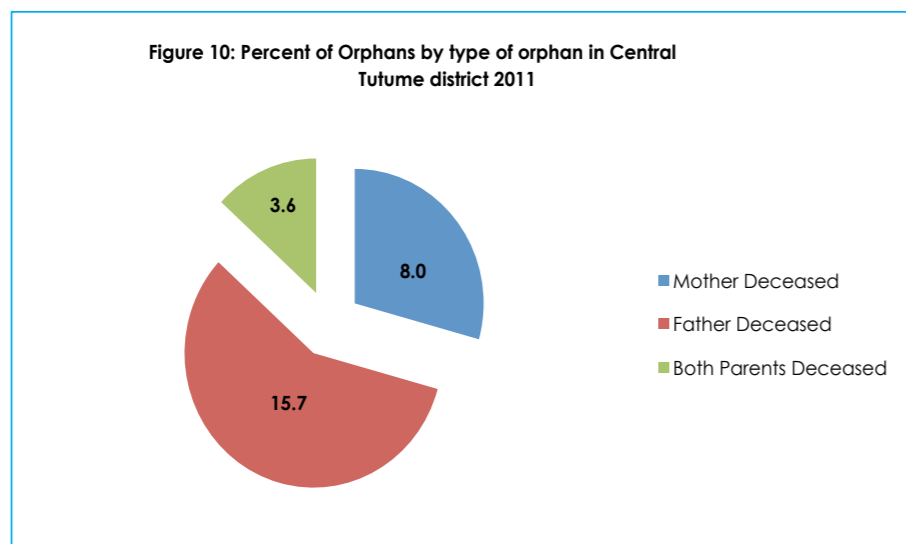


Figure 9 shows that only 16.1 percent of the population of the district aged 12 years and above were reportedly married in comparison with 56.1 percent who had never been married. The second highest group was those who were living together or cohabiting at 21.2 percent. This raises the need for continual efforts to promote marriage as an institution for child bearing and rearing.

### 14.0 Orphan-hood

The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and global partners define an orphan as a child who has lost one or both parents. Evidence clearly shows that the vast majority of orphans are living with a surviving parent, grandparent, or other family member. A further 95 percent of all orphans are over the age of five.

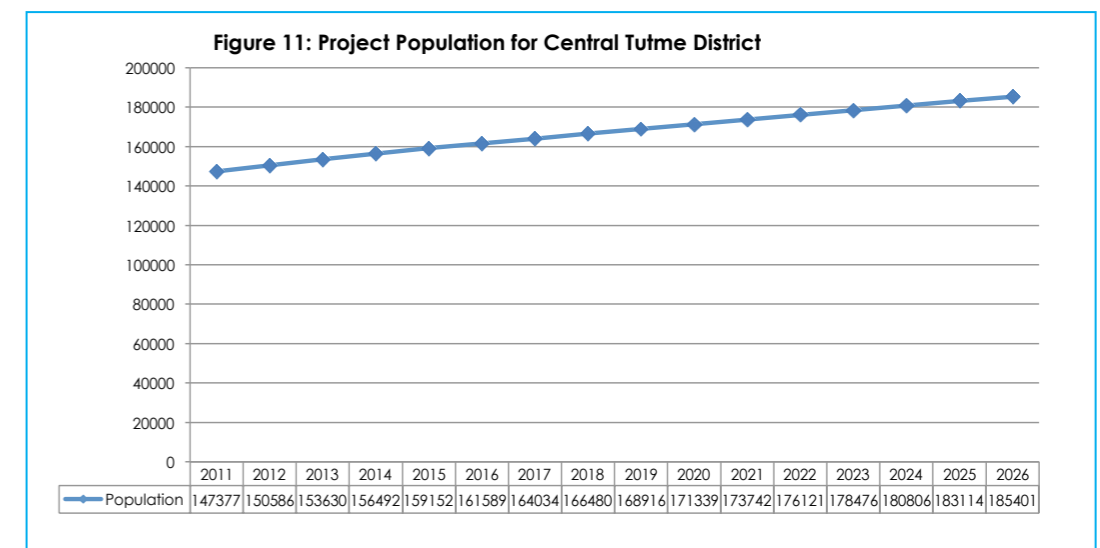


This definition contrasts with concepts of orphan-hood in many industrialised countries, where a child must have lost both parents to qualify as an orphan. UNICEF and numerous international organisations adopted the broader definition of orphan in the mid-1990s as the AIDS pandemic began leading to the death of millions of parents worldwide, leaving an ever increasing number of children growing up without one or more parents. So the terminology of a 'single orphan' – the loss of one parent – and a 'double orphan' – the loss of both parents – was born to convey this growing crisis<sup>4</sup>.

Botswana defines an orphan as a child aged below 18 who has lost one or both parents<sup>5</sup>. Figure 10 shows that 15.7 percent of orphans had lost a father as compared to 8 percent who had lost their mother. Only 3.6 percent had lost both parents.

### 15.0 Projected Population 2011 – 2026

The population of the district was estimated to have grown by 19.3 percent between 2001 and 2011, thereby growing at 1.9 percent annually during the period. It is estimated that by 2026, the population of the district will reach 185,401, which will be an addition of 38,024 inhabitants from the 2011 figure of 147,377.

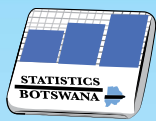
