PREFACE

International Merchandise Trade Statistics (**IMTS**) measure the flow of goods across national borders and can be used to spot emerging markets, gauge competition, and identify export and import opportunities. As a result, it is integral to the process of globalisation by keeping track of all exchanges of goods between trading partners. The transaction reflects the value of goods that add to (Imports) or subtract from (Exports), the stock of material resources of a country. Trade statistics continue to be one of the key indicators of economic performance and global competitiveness.

The monthly International Merchandise Trade Statistics are used extensively in the compilation of national accounts and balance of payments. Furthermore, these statistics are used by government institutions and other stakeholders for trade negotiations and other various purposes.

This publication outlines Botswana's monthly International Merchandise Trade Statistics (**IMTS**) for May 2026. The report provides summaries of international trade in goods, as shown in **Table 1.0**. **Tables 2.1** and **2.2** show trade by Principal commodity groupings for imports and exports, respectively, whereas **Table 2.3** solely shows trade in diamonds. The direction of trade appears in **Table 3.1A** (imports) and **Table 3.2A** (total exports). Major trading partner countries by commodity groups, as a percentage of trade at regional or country level, for the current period are presented in **Table 3.1B** for imports and **Table 3.2B** for exports. The top traded import and export commodities excluding diamonds for the month under review are presented in **Tables 4.1** & **4.2** respectively. This is to guide users on opportunities to produce commodities for import substitution or possible exportation.

Changes in data for the corresponding months in the current versus previous digests may be attributed to data from transactions that had deferred customs duty assessments or delayed customs processes. The data for such transactions would only be available at a later stage after customs duty assessments have been completed.

International trade statistics by mode of transport are collected for the active modes of transport (road, rail, air) through which goods are presumed to enter or leave the statistical territory of the country. Such data may be used to formulate transport policy, monitor international transport routes or assess the impact of international trade on the environment.

This publication also reflects the value of Goods in Transit. Transit trade is vital in facilitating economic transformation and regional trade, while contributing to the growth of employment, incomes, tax revenues, and directly to improving the balance of payments through export of services.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This International Merchandise Trade Statistics (**IMTS**) monthly digest provides a summary of trade statistics on Botswana's total imports and exports of goods for May 2026. International Merchandise Trade Statistics records all goods which add to, or subtract from, the stock of material resources of a country by entering (as imports) or leaving (as exports) its economic territory.

In May 2026, Botswana's imported goods valued at P8, 065.5 million experiencing a decrease of 4.1 percent from the revised April 2026 value of P8, 408.4 million. The leading import commodity groups were Fuel and Diamonds at 24.5 percent and 19.1 percent of the total, respectively. Machinery & Electrical Equipment and Food, Beverages & Tobacco followed with contributions of 15.0 percent and 13.9 percent respectively. The main source of imports was the Southern African Customs Union (**SACU**) at 69.6 percent. Asia and the European Union (**EU**) accounted for 11.8 percent and 6.4 percent of total imports, correspondingly. At country level, South Africa was the main supplier of imports at 57.4 percent of the total, followed by Namibia at 11.8 percent (**Table 3.1A**).

The value of Botswana's exports in May 2026 amounted to P4, 817.5 million, registering a 22.4 percent decrease compared to the revised export value of P6, 209.7 million recorded in April 2026. Diamonds and Copper were the most exported commodities accounting for 59.0 percent and 25.6 percent of total exports respectively.

During the period under review, Botswana's exports absorption was heavily skewed towards Asia at 58.5 percent, followed by **SACU** with a market share of 15.0 percent. The **EU** regional block received 8.8 percent. At country level, Botswana's top export destinations were the United Arab Emirates (**UAE**), China and India at 27.8 percent, 14.0 percent and 12.9 percent of total exports, respectively (**Table 3.2A**). South Africa and Australia contributed significantly by receiving 11.0 percent and 10.2 percent of Botswana's exports, respectively.

Imports amounting to 72.2 percent were transported into the country by Road during the period under consideration. Goods transported by Air and Rail made 19.7 percent and 8.1 percent of total imports, respectively. Goods exported by Air accounted for 59.5 percent of total exports, while those transferred by Road and Rail represented 39.4 percent and 1.1 percent respectively (**Table B**).

Merchandise worth P26, 725.3 million transited through the country to various destinations. Pioneer Gate processed the highest value of transit goods at 42.1 percent, while Kazungula Bridge and Ghanzi handled 29.7 percent and 25.7 percent of goods in transit, respectively (**Table C1**). The top transiting goods were classified under, Chapter 74 (Copper and articles thereof) at 49.8 percent followed by Chapter 28 (Inorganic chemicals; organic and inorganic compounds of precious metals; of rare earth metals, of radioactive elements and of isotopes) at 10.5 percent of all goods in transit, (**Table C2**).

Botswana's export earnings decreased by **22.4 percent (P1, 392.3 million)** from the revised April 2026 figure of **P6, 209.7 million** to **P4, 817.5 million** registered in May 2026.

1.0 TOTAL TRADE

Total merchandise trade refers to imports, domestic exports, re-exports and trade balance between countries or regions over a specific period. The discussions are based on May 2026, which is also referred to as the reference period, the period under review or the current month, throughout the digest.

1.1 Data Revision

The current monthly digest is based on preliminary figures with regard to the reference period. Revisions to the monthly trade statistics data are a standard practice necessary to incorporate additional and more comprehensive information that was unavailable at the time of the initial release, as a result of late customs duty assessments or processes. Revisions are made on a monthly basis when monthly data files are uploaded into the database, thereby enriching the information for previous months. In some instances, revisions are negligible, while notably significant in others.

The inclusion of additional data for the previous month, incorporated during the compilation of May 2026, led to upward revisions in both trade flows for April 2026. Imports increased by 2.3 percent (P189.1 million), while total exports rose by 5.0 percent (P298.3 million).

Table A shows revised data, comparing figures from the previous digest with those of the month under review.

1.2 Imports

Imports are valued on a Cost, Insurance, and Freight (**CIF**) basis. This means the price includes the value of the goods, as well as the insurance and freight costs incurred in transporting them to their destination. However, it excludes customs duties and any other charges paid upon arrival at the importing country's border.

In May 2026, Botswana's total imports were valued at P8, 065.5 million, recording contraction of 4.1 percent (P343.0 million) from the revised April 2026 value of P8, 408.4 million. The overall fall was driven by a decrease in Vehicles & Transport Equipment and Machinery & Electrical Equipment imports by 67.2 percent (P915.2 million) and 15.8 percent (P227.8 million), respectively. More details are displayed in **Table 2.1**.

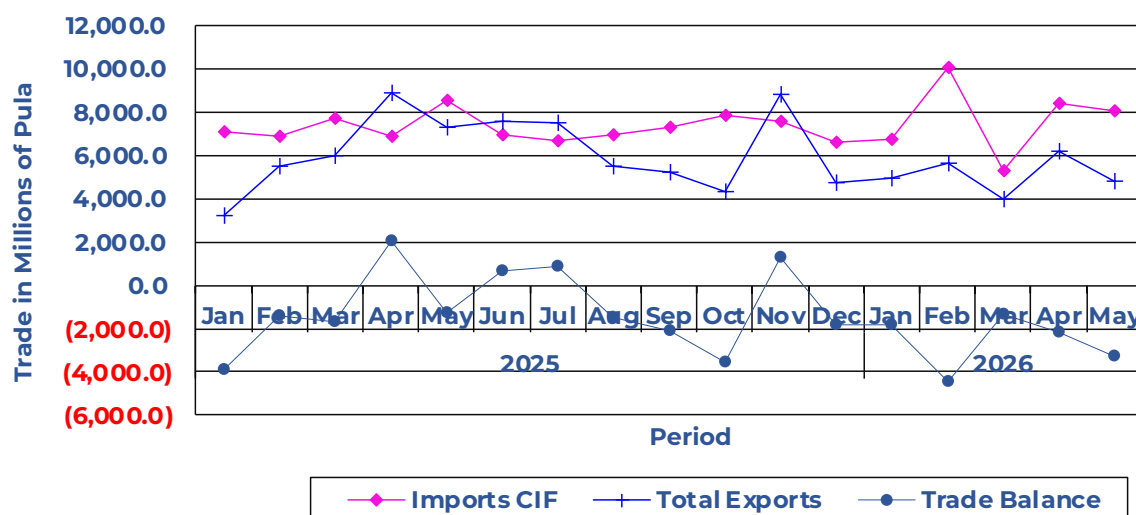
1.3 Total Exports

Botswana's export earnings decreased by 22.4 percent (P1, 392.3 million) from the revised April 2026 figure of P6, 209.7 million to P4, 817.5 million registered in May 2026. The fall was mainly driven by Diamonds and Copper exports, which fell by 23.1 percent (P856.0 million) and 27.9 percent (P477.9 million) correspondingly.

1.4 Trade Balance

In May 2026, Botswana recorded a trade deficit of P3, 248.0 million, representing the second largest deficit in 2026. The largest deficit was P4, 436.8 million recorded in February 2026([Table 1.0](#)). [Chart 1.0](#) displays the graphical presentation of the trade balance from January 2025 to May 2026.

2.0 TRADE BY PRINCIPAL COMMODITY GROUPS

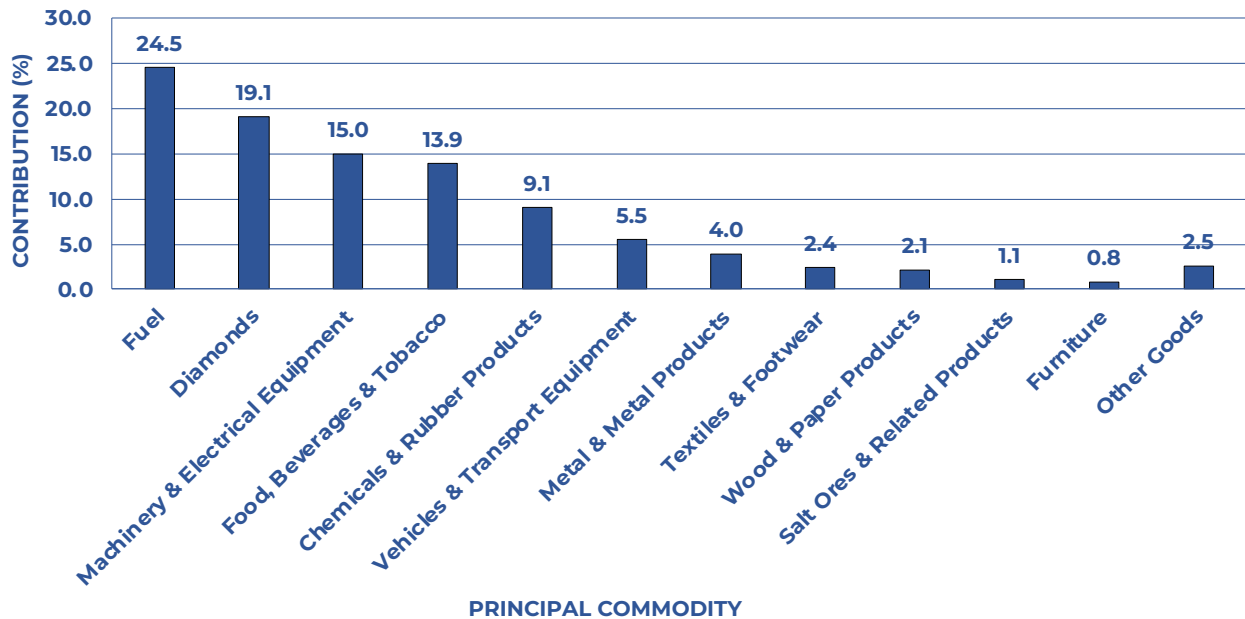
Principal commodity groups refer to selections of related commodities grouped together to form major groups. Commodities forming a group may be of related chapters or commodities, for example 'Vehicles & Transport Equipment' combines vehicles and other equipment used for transport purposes.

In cases where it becomes a challenge to come up with further groups of related chapters or commodities, the remaining commodities are grouped together under the general category called 'Other'. This occurs when a commodity group's contribution to the total is minimal.

2.1 Principal Imports

The top imported commodity groups were Fuel; Diamonds and Machinery & Electrical Equipment, followed by Food, Beverages & Tobacco. Fuel was the largest contributor to total imports, accounting for 24.5 percent (P1, 974.6 million), followed by Diamonds, which contributed 19.1 percent (P1, 543.5 million). Machinery & Electrical Equipment and Food, Beverages & Tobacco accounted for 15.0 percent (P1, 210.2 million) and 13.9 percent (P1, 117.7 million), respectively. Contributions made by other commodity groups can be viewed in [Table 2.1](#) and [Chart 2.1](#).

CHART 2.1: Composition of Principal Imports – May 2026 (Percentage)

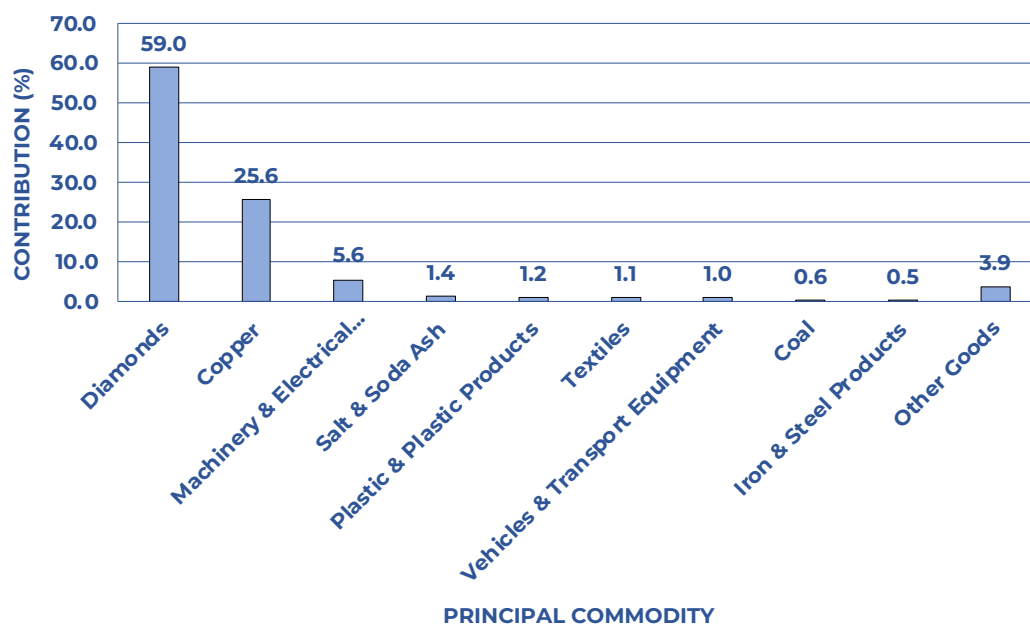

2.2 Principal Exports

Diamonds remained the dominant export commodity group, with a contribution of 59.0 percent (P2, 844.5 million) to total exports, followed by Copper at 25.6 percent (P1, 234.2 million). Machinery & Electrical Equipment ranked third, with a contribution of 5.6 percent (P270.6 million). Contributions made by other commodity groups are presented in [Table 2.2](#) and [Chart 2.2](#).

3.0 DIRECTION OF TRADE

The direction of Trade analyses the value of merchandise trade disaggregated according to a country's primary trading partners. As a result the direction of trade outlines the last known destination for exports and sources of imports. Only major trading partners are considered individually, while smaller trading partners are grouped together under a general category. Trade by major partner countries, regions and principal commodity groups for imports and exports, during May 2026 appears in **Table 3.1A** and **Table 3.2A**, respectively. **Table 3.1B** (imports) and **Table 3.2B** (exports) show percentage distributions for major sources and destinations by principal commodity groups during the same month.

3.1 Imports by Major Trading Partner Countries and Regions

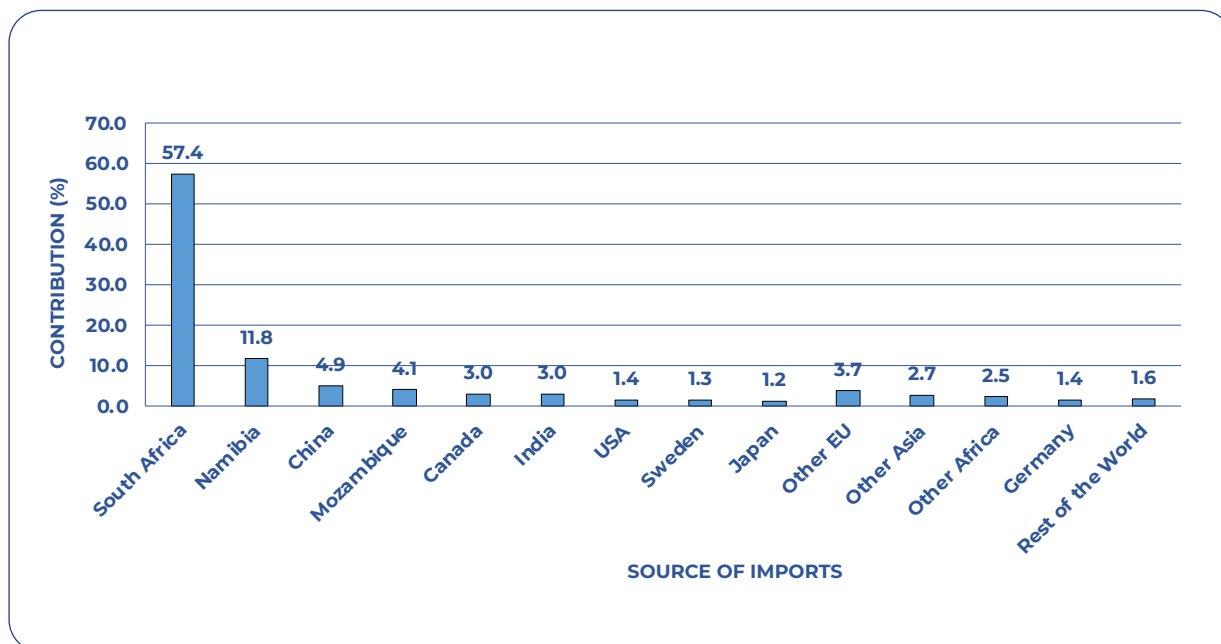
The **SACU** region remained the largest source of imports, accounting for 69.6 percent (P5, 610.5 million) of total imports. Fuel and Diamonds, were the most imported commodity groups, at 26.6 percent (P1, 492.8 million) and 22.1 percent (P1, 240.2 million) in that order. Food, Beverages & Tobacco and Chemicals & Rubber Products followed at 15.9 percent (P892.0 million) and 9.5 percent (P533.4 million) in that sequence. Among the **SACU** member states, South Africa was the largest source of imports, accounting for 57.4 percent (P4, 626.6 million) of the total. Namibia was the second largest supplier, contributing 11.8 percent (P954.6 million) of total imports as displayed in **Table 3.1A** and **Table 3.1B**.

During the period under review, Botswana imported goods valued at P954.0 million from the Asia region, accounting for 11.8 percent of total imports. The main commodity group imported from the region was Machinery & Electrical Equipment with a contribution of 49.7 percent (P473.8 million) to total imports from the region. Vehicles & Transport Equipment and Chemicals & Rubber Products followed at 10.8 percent (P102.7 million) and 9.7 percent (P92.9 million), respectively. In Asia, China contributed highest to total imports at 4.9 percent (P396.1 million), followed by India and Japan at 3.0 percent (P242.9 million) and 1.2 percent (P93.4 million), respectively. Figures are shown in **Table 3.1A** and **Table 3.1B**.

Botswana imported goods valued at P515.1 million from the **EU** during the period under review, accounting for 6.4 percent of total imports. Machinery & Electrical Equipment dominated imports, contributing 39.8 percent (P205.1 million). Fuel made up 20.1 percent (P103.5 million) of the total imports from the region. This was followed by Food, Beverages & Tobacco and Chemical and Rubber Products, with contributions of 14.2 percent (P73.3 million) and 13.9 percent (P71.8 million) of the total imports from the region, respectively. Within the **EU**, Germany and Sweden contributed highest, at 1.4 percent (P113.3 million) and 1.3 percent (P106.5 million) to the total imports respectively (**Table 3.1A** and **Table 3.1B**).

During the month under review, Botswana sourced imports worth P244.8 million from Canada, representing 3.0 percent of total imports. Imports from the **USA** amounted to P113.2 million, accounting for 1.4 percent of total imports. Diamonds accounted for the largest share of imports from Canada, contributing 72.1 percent (P176.4 million), followed by Machinery & Electrical Equipment at 24.8 percent (P60.6 million). Similarly, imports from the **USA**, were largely composed of Machinery & Electrical Equipment and Diamonds, with contributions of 34.7 percent (P39.2 million) and 27.0 percent (P30.6 million) of total Imports from that country, respectively. Sources of imports during May 2026 can be viewed in **Table 3.1A** and **Chart 3.1**.

3.2 Exports by Major Trading Partner Countries and Regions

The majority of Botswana's merchandise exports were destined for Asian markets, followed by shares to **SACU** and the Europe (**EU**) regions in that order.

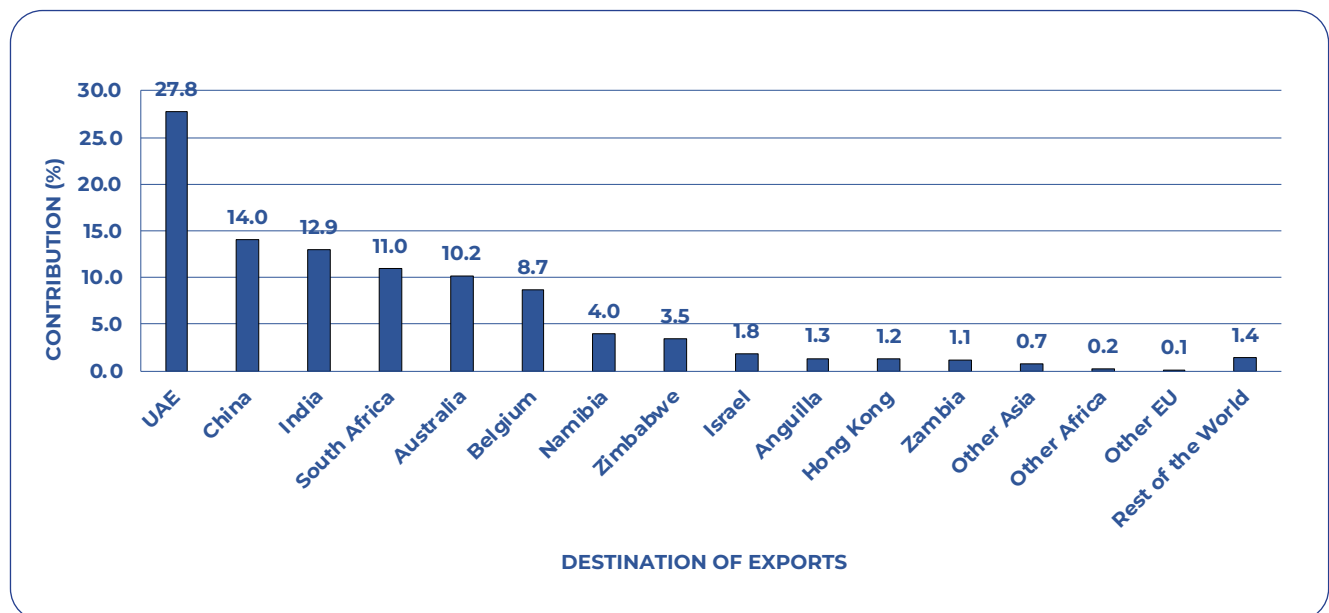
Asia being the largest export market for Botswana received 58.5 percent (P2, 819.3 million) of total exports. Diamonds and Copper were the major commodity groups exported to the region, at 75.6 percent (P2, 131.0 million) and 24.0 percent (P676.8 million), respectively. Top export destinations within Asia were the **UAE** and China which received 27.8 percent (P1, 340.1 million) and 14.0 percent (P676.8 million) of total exports, respectively. India followed with a contribution of 12.9 percent (P623.5 million) of total exports, as displayed in **Table 3.2A** and **Table 3.2B**.

During the assessment period, exports to the **SACU** region accounted for 15.0 percent (P724.6 million) of Botswana's total exports. Machinery & Electrical Equipment, Diamonds and Salt & Soda Ash were the major commodity groups exported to the customs union. Machinery & Electrical Equipment and Diamonds accounted for 32.4 percent (P234.9 million) and 32.1 percent (P232.7 million), respectively. Salt & Soda Ash contributed 7.1 percent (P51.2 million). South Africa was the main recipient of exports within **SACU**, at 11.0 percent (P529.6 million) of total exports, as in **Table 3.2A**.

In May 2026, exports to the **EU** amounted to P422.5 million, representing 8.8 percent of total exports. Diamonds was the main commodity group exported to the EU, at 98.8 percent (P417.6 million). Belgium was the main destination for exports to the union, accounting for 8.7 percent (P417.6 million) of total exports. All exports to Belgium consisted of Diamonds, as displayed in **Table 3.2A** and **Table 3.2B**.

Australia received exports worth P490.8 million, representing 10.2 percent of Botswana's total exports in May 2026. Copper was the main commodity group exported to that country. Contributions made by other countries are presented in **Table 3.2A** and **Table 3.2B**.

4.0 IMPORTS AND EXPORTS BY TOP IMPORTED AND EXPORTED COMMODITIES

The top traded commodities for both import and export flows for May 2026 are summarized in **Table 4.1** and **Table 4.2**, respectively. These tables highlight the most actively traded goods (excluding diamonds) to help users identify opportunities for import substitution, potential export expansion, and broader economic diversification.

4.1 Top Imported commodities (excluding Diamonds)

The country's top 50 imported commodities excluding diamonds accounted for 43.9 percent (P3, 542.6 million) of total imports during May 2026. Distillate fuel was the leading imported commodity among the top 50 commodities, contributing 16.3 percent (P1, 059.9 million) to total non-diamond imports. Petrol and Other Static converters ranked second and third, with shares of 9.6 percent (P625.0 million) and 3.2 percent (P211.3 million), respectively. Other Wheat & Meslin and Electrical energy followed in fourth and fifth place with a share of 1.7 percent (P113.0 million) and 1.6 percent (P107.4 million), respectively.

4.2 Top Exported commodities (excluding Diamonds)

In May 2026, the country's top 50 exported commodities excluding diamonds accounted for 38.3 percent (P1, 845.8 million) of total exports. Among the top 50, Copper ores & concentrates was the leading export commodity accounting for 62.6 percent (P1, 234.2 million) of total non-diamonds exports. Ignition wiring sets & other wiring sets (used in vehicles, aircraft or ships) and Other electric conductors, for a voltage not exceeding 1000V fitted with connectors followed in second and third positions, with contributions of 6.8 percent (P134.0 million) and 2.8 percent (P54.3 million), respectively. Disodium carbonate ranked fourth at 2.3 percent (P46.0 million) while Tubes, pipes & hoses, rigid, of polymers of vinyl chloride completed the top five, with a share of 1.8 percent (P34.6 million).

5.0 TRADE BY MODE OF TRANSPORT

Trade by mode of transport refers to trade classification activities based on the method of transportation used to move goods between countries or regions. This helps in understanding the flow of goods across borders and can provide insights into trade patterns, identifying bottlenecks and infrastructure needs and can be used as guidance in formulating transport policies. Active modes of transport mainly used in Botswana for movement of international merchandise trade are Air, Road and Rail. **Table B** presents statistics relating to modes of transport while **Chart B** gives the graphical illustration.

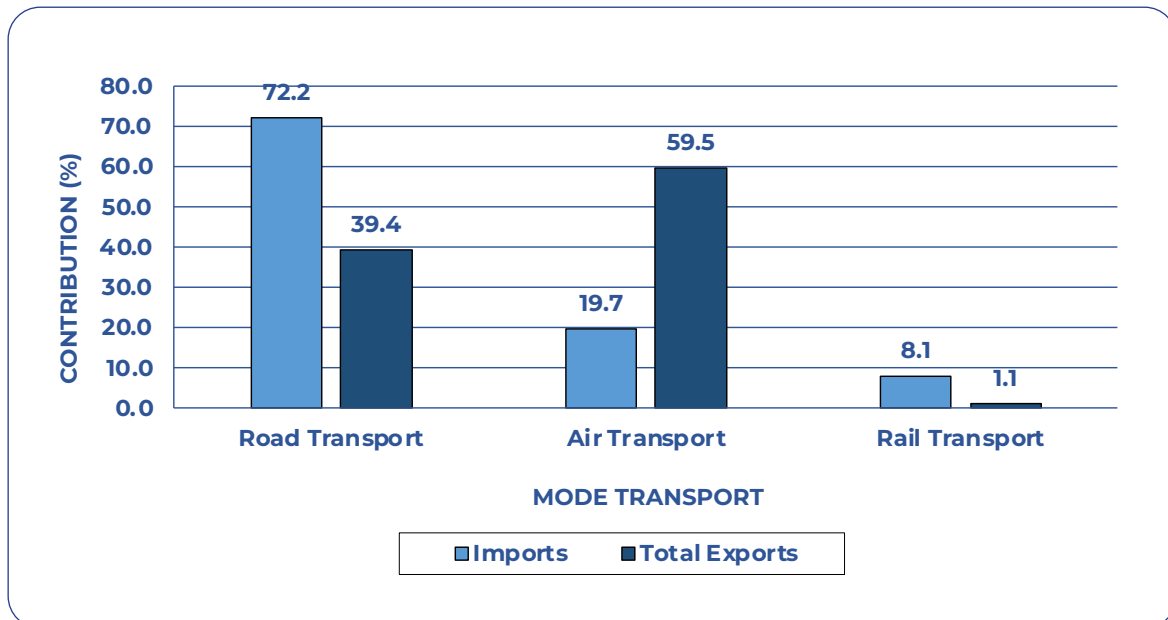
During the month under review, imports representing 72.2 percent (P5, 825.0 million) were transported into the country by Road, whereas those imported by Air and Rail accounted for 19.7 percent (P1, 587.9 million) and 8.1 percent (P652.7 million) of total imports respectively.

In May 2026, goods valued at P2, 868.0 million, reflecting 59.5 percent of total exports left the country by Air. Goods exported by Road and Rail accounted for 39.4 percent (P1, 898.4 million) and 1.1 percent (P51.1 million) of total exports, respectively.

6.0 TRANSIT TRADE

Transit trade refers to the movement of goods from one country to another through a third country, without the goods being subject to customs duties and other import restrictions in the intermediary country. Essentially, it involves the transportation of goods across a country that lies between the country of origin and the final destination. Countries that serve as transit hubs often provide infrastructure and services to facilitate transit trade. These countries may benefit economically from transit trade through fees, tariffs, or other charges associated with transportation services or by stimulating economic activity related to trade and transportation.

Overall, the purpose of transit trade is to overcome geographical, logistical, and economic constraints to facilitate the movement of goods between countries or regions efficiently, cost-effectively and securely. It plays a crucial role in promoting international trade, economic development, and regional integration.

Countries involved in transit trade typically have agreements and protocols in place to govern the movement of goods through their territory without the imposition of customs duties and other trade barriers. This helps to streamline the transportation of goods and reduce logistical challenges for businesses engaged in international trade.

Transit trade is subject to compliance with specific regulations and documentation requirements to ensure the proper monitoring and control of the movement of goods. Violations or misuse of transit trade arrangements can lead to penalties and legal consequences.

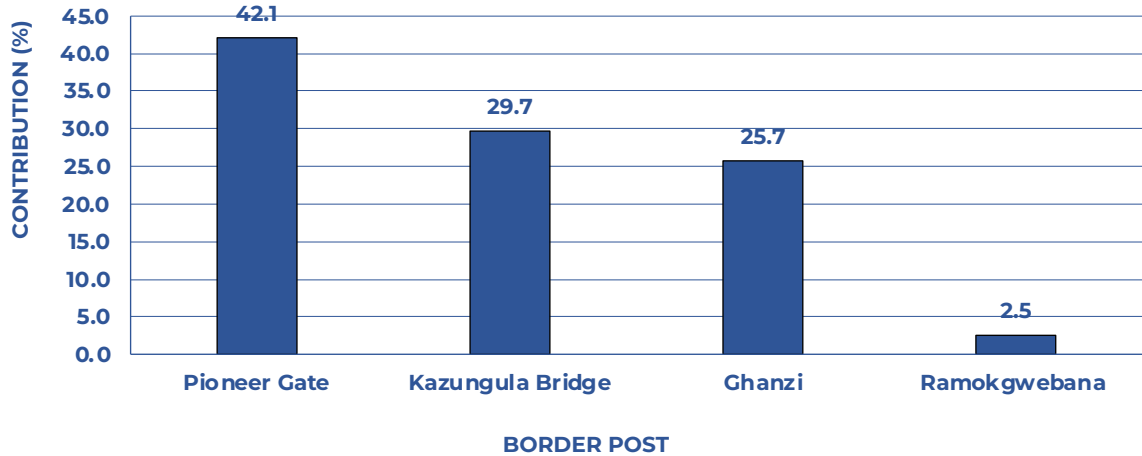
6.1 Transit Trade by Border Post/ Customs Office

During May 2026, goods amounting to P26, 725.3 million transited through Botswana destined for various countries. Pioneer Gate, Kazungula bridge and Ghanzi handled goods accounting for 42.1 percent (P11, 247.3 million), 29.7 percent (P7, 942.5 million) and 25.7 percent (P6, 860.9 million) respectively as displayed in **Table C1** and **Chart C1**.

6.2 Transit by Chapter

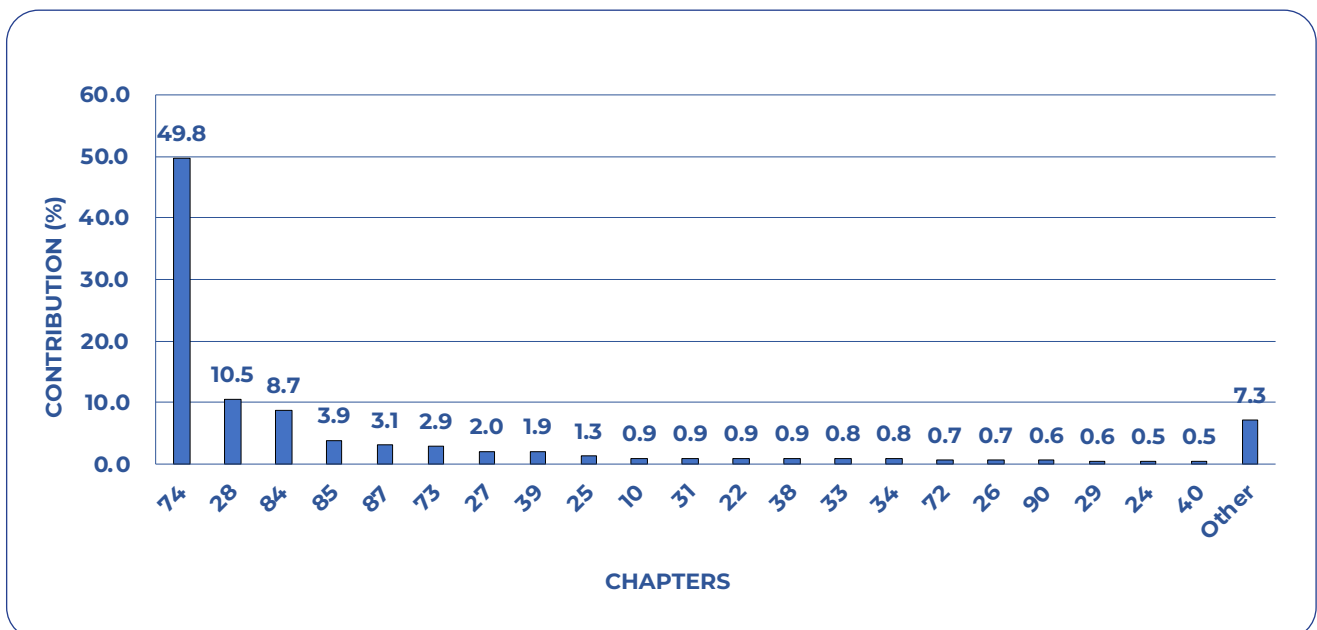
Chapter 74 (Copper and articles thereof) was the main transiting good, contributing 49.8 percent (P13, 307.1 million). Chapter 28 (Inorganic chemicals; organic and inorganic compounds of precious metals; of rare earth metals, of radioactive elements & of isotopes) followed at 10.5 percent (P2, 808.9 million) of all goods in transit, as shown in **Table C2** and **Chart C2**.

8.0 Concepts, Sources and Methods

IMTS are compiled by the International Merchandise Trade Statistics Section of Statistics Botswana, and uses the General Trade system. International Merchandise Trade refers to external trade in goods only. International Service Trade Statistics (ISTS) are however not compiled by this section. The primary source of international merchandise trade data is the Customs & Excise Division at the Botswana Unified Revenue Service (BURS). The Customs & Excise Division is responsible for data capture for both computerised and manual borders, and the monthly raw data files are transferred to Statistics Botswana for data processing.

Imports are valued **CIF** (cost, insurance & freight), while exports are valued **FOB** (free on board). The value of imports includes transport and insurance costs to the importing country. The Exports value consists only of the value of goods as they leave the exporting country.

8.1 Time of Recording of Trade

IMTS is compiled using date of recording of trade as opposed to date of assessment of goods by customs. This means that as goods cross the border, trade is recorded and this is the reference month for compilation of IMTS. Some of these goods may however be held by customs for some time pending final assessment for tax or duty purposes.

If the final assessment is done later, for example two or three months, or even more, after the goods had crossed the border, the affected trade will then update trade for the particular month when the goods crossed the border, therefore it does not form part of trade for the month during which the final assessment was done. This is mostly common with imports. Revision of data for the month preceding the one under review will normally show high values as compared to revisions for other months due to more goods (from the previous month) being released after final assessment.

8.2 Concepts and Definitions

- i. **Domestic Exports:** These are goods originating from the compiling country, being permanently exported out of the country for consumption in the outside world. This includes products from customs inwards processing; for example, if a country imports wheat, processes the wheat into bread flour and exports the bread flour and bye products from the milling process, these will all leave the country as domestic exports.
- ii. **Re - Exports:** These are exports of foreign goods that were initially recorded as imports into the compiling country. These goods are exported in the same state that they came in except for wear and tear. An example will be re-exportation of a motor vehicle that was initially imported into the compiling country and after being used it is now being exported to a foreign country.
- iii. **Total exports:** This is the sum of domestic exports and re-exports
- iv. **Imports:** These are goods imported from the outside world, into the compiling country, for local consumption. This includes re-importation of locally produced goods that were initially exported and are now being imported back into the country.
- v. **Trade Balance (Net Export):** This refers to the total value of goods exported minus the total value of goods imported by a given economy in a given period of time. A positive trade balance (trade surplus) indicates that a country is exporting more in value terms than it is importing. A negative trade balance (trade deficit) indicates that the country is importing more than it is exporting.

8.3 Exclusions from IMTS

- i. **Goods in Transit** - This is trade that is simply passing through the compiling country solely for the purpose of being transported to another country.
- ii. **Goods temporarily admitted or dispatched** - These are goods that, at the time of admission/dispatch, are intended to stay in the receiving country temporarily and that after their stay they will be returned in the same state. These goods include display equipment for trade fairs and exhibitions, commercial samples, means of transport, containers, equipment for working, etc.
- iii. **Monetary Gold**- This is gold to which the monetary authorities have title and is held as reserve assets.
- iv. **Issued banknotes and securities and coins in circulation**-These goods represent evidence of financial claims and are excluded from IMTS

The above list of exclusions from IMTS is, however, not exhaustive and only a few that are common, simple, straightforward and easy to understand have been picked as examples.
