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

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BOTSWANA MATERNAL MORTALITY RATIO 2019

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
Botswana Maternal Mortality Ratio 2019

The brief shows that 87 maternal deaths were reported in 2019 from 52,304 live births. The Maternal Mortality Ratio declined steadily from 156.6 in 2016 to 133.7 in 2018 and is estimated at 166.3 deaths per 100,000 live births in 2019. The most common direct causes were Other immediate postpartum hemorrhages (15 Cases) followed by Genital tract and pelvic infection, following abortion and ectopic and molar pregnancy (11 deaths) while among the indirect causes the most common causes were, Diseases of the circulatory system complicating pregnancy, childbirth and the puerperium (10 cases) followed by Other maternal infections and parasitic diseases complicating pregnancy childbirth and the puerperium (7 deaths).

In Q3 2020, fixed telephone to mobile telephone domestic calls traffic went up by 11.5 percent while mobile telephone to fixed telephone domestic calls traffic increased by 24.4 percent. Outgoing international calls from fixed telephones declined by 44.4 percent, while those from mobile telephones increased by 1.7 percent. The contribution of the Postal and Communications Services Sector to the economy stood at 3.2 percent of Gross Domestic Product at current prices. The sector's value added at current prices amounted to P1, 438.2 million.

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

During the period under study, from April to September 2020, Shakawe received the highest total rainfall in a month, recording 94.0 mm, followed by Goodhope recording 66.0 mm, and Werda recording 46.2 mm, all in April 2020. The highest rainfall recorded in 24 hours was for Shakawe at 32.0 mm followed by Goodhope at 29.0 mm, both in April 2020 and Werda at 20.2 mm, in September 2020. The wettest area was Shakawe, recording a total of 122.6 mm followed by Werda recording 74.4 mm, and Goodhope recording 68.6 mm over the six months.

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

The total labour force aged 15 years and above was estimated at 972,606 persons, comprising 479,693 (49.2 percent) males, and 492,913 (50.8 percent females). Out of a total of 237,222 job seekers, 53.4 percent (127,062) were females, compared with 46.6 percent (111,669) males.



Work Permits Holders Quarter 2, 2020

This brief shows that the number of work permit holders has increased by 7.4 percent between March 2020 and June 2020, from 4,321 to 4,640. Most permit holders were recorded in the agricultural sector at 26.1 percent followed by the education sector with 16.4 percent. The largest group of work permit holders was the age group 40-44 with 18.2 percent followed by 45-49 and 35-39 at 16.8 and 16.2 percent respectively.








Botswana Data Quality Assessment Framework User's Manual

It is also aimed at educating data producers on the advantages of using a framework for data quality and would assist in the provision of a common approach to data quality assessment.



Crime Statistics Report 2019

The results show that there were 9,499 decided cases in 2019. The highest proportion (22.7 percent) of cases was decided in December. This was followed by 15.6 percent of cases disposed of in November. The lowest proportion of cases disposed of was recorded in January (4.2 percent) followed by those disposed of in July (4.8 percent).



Secondary Education Stats Brief 2017

The report shows that there has been an increase of 5.4 percent in the number of secondary schools, from 278 in 2005 to 293 in 2015. However, a decrease of 5.8 percent was recorded in several Privately owned secondary schools between 2015 and 2017. Out of the 290 secondary schools that operated in 2017, Government schools constituted 81.7 percent of all secondary schools in the country, while government-aided and private schools constituted 1.4 and 16.9 percent respectively.




Out-Patient and Preventive Health Statistical Brief 2019

The report shows that between 2018 and 2019 Out-Patient attendees on Notifiable Diseases increased from 451,537 in 2018 to 481,063 in 2019, and Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) increased from 515,812 in 2018 to 551,694 in 2019. Ante-Natal Care (ANC) increased from 367,489 in 2018 to 375,998 in 2019, Other Diseases increased from 3,667,421 in 2018 3,892,672 in 2019. Out-Patient attendees for other services, like Family Planning, Well Baby Care, Dressings, and Tetanus Toxoid have also shown an increase. The report also shows that there was an outbreak of diarrhea for week 51 only in 2019.




Index of the Physical Volume of Mining Production Stats Brief Quarter 4, 2020

The Index of Electricity Generation (IEG) stood at 123.1 during the fourth quarter of 2020, reflecting a year-on-year decrease of 7.0 percent compared to 132.4 recorded during the corresponding quarter in 2019. The quarter-on-quarter comparison shows a decrease of 14.4 percent, from 143.8 during the third quarter of 2020 to 123.1 during the current quarter.




Gross Domestic Product Quarter 4, 2020

The nominal Gross Domestic Product for the fourth quarter of 2020 was P48, 461.8 million compared to a revised P44, 702.9 million registered during the previous quarter. This represents a quarterly increase of 8.4 percent in nominal terms between the two periods. During the quarter under review, Trade, Hotels & Restaurants became the major contributor to GDP at 19.2 percent, followed by General Government, Finance & Business Services, and Mining & Quarrying by 16.6, 15.1, and 11.9 percent respectively. The contribution of other sectors was below 7.0 percent, with Water & Electricity being the lowest at 1.3 percent.



Transport & Infrastructure Stats Brief Quarter 3, 2020

In Q3 2020, 11,818 motor vehicles were registered for the first time while only 5,281 were registered in the previous quarter. Out of this total, 80.1 percent were used vehicles, 19.9 percent were new, and 0.1 percent were rebuilt. Sixty-nine point four percent (69.4) of the firstly registered motor vehicles were imported from Japan while 19.9 percent were from South Africa.




Work Permits Holders Stats Brief Quarter 3, 2020

The total number of work permit holders that were valid as of the end of September 2020 was 4,140. Of these employees account for 3,528 (85.2 percent) while self-employees accounted for 612 (14.8 percent). Overall, males were in the majority accounting for 73.7 percent of total work permit holders, with females in the minority at 26.3 percent.




Transport and Infrastructure Stats Brief Quarter 4, 2020

A total of 14,308 vehicles were registered for the first time in Q4 2020, an increase of 21.1 percent from the previous quarter. Of these vehicles, 81.7 percent were used vehicles, 18.2 percent were brand new and 0.1 percent were rebuilt. Most of these vehicles were imported from Japan, at 72.8 percent of the total. The second-highest number of vehicles came from South Africa and they accounted for 17.3 percent.




Producer Price Index (Mining and Utilities) Quarter 4, 2019

The Utilities Producer Price Index in the Fourth Quarter of 2019 remained constant at 111.2, the same index as in the Third Quarter of 2019. The year-on-year Utility Producer Price inflation for the fourth quarter of 2019 recorded zero percent, the same rate as in the third quarter of 2019.



Work Permits Holders Stats Brief Quarter 4 2020

The results presented in this brief show a decline in work permit holders from 4,140 in September 2020 to 3,895 in December 2020, a decrease of 5.9 percent. The Agricultural sector continues to record the majority of the work permit holders with 23.9 percent followed by Education with 15.5 percent. Work permit holders by age group showed that overall, the number of persons aged 40-44 was leading with 18.2 percent followed by 35-39 and 45-49 both recording 16.8 percent.



As of February 2021, Botswana's total imports were valued at P 3,376,087,031. In this amount, food imports contributed P 667,422,831, translating to 19.8 percent. Beverages, Spices & Nuts & Veggies accounted for 18.4 percent of total imports, followed by Preparations of cereals, fruit, starch or milk, sports code products with 11.4 percent and 9.3 percent respectively.

Preparations of cereals, fruit, starch or milk, sports code products and Beverages, Spices & Nuts & Veggies, during February 2021, accounting for 35.1 percent and 28.9 percent respectively, being classified as essential, concerning wheat flour or other wheat-based products or flours followed with 10.1 percent.

With regard to Cereals, the most imported types were maize (corn), other than seed accounting for 33.9 percent, followed by wheat or meslin, other than seed accounting for 18.4 percent and 15.9 percent respectively.

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

In February 2021, Botswana's total imports were valued at P 6, 316,125, 031. In this amount food imports contributed P 720, 782, 001, translating to 11.4 percent. Cereals accounted for 18.4 percent of food imports, followed by Preparations of vegetables, fruit, nuts, or other parts of plants with 9.3 percent.


Child Poverty in Botswana Updating the National Multiple Overlapping Deprivation Analysis (N-MODA), April 2021

The update reveals that there has been a substantial reduction in the extent of deprivation across age groups between 2009/10 and 2015/16 in Botswana. The proportion of children under-18 years experiencing two or more deprivations declined from 63 to 49 percent. About 68 percent of rural children were multidimensional poor, while 27 and 41 percent of children from cities and urban villages, respectively, are deprived in two or more dimensions.



Annual Consumer Price Index: 2020 In Review

The annual average inflation rate of 1.9 percent recorded in 2020 was below the lower bound of the inflation target range of 3 – 6 percent set out by the Bank of Botswana. The slowing average annual inflation rate for 2020 was mostly attributable to a decline in consumer spending due to the impact of measures that were put in place to combat the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic. The first COVID-19 extreme Social Distancing (Lockdown) was effected over the periods from the 2nd of April to the 22nd of May 2020 which imposed movement restrictions on people.




Annual Agricultural Survey Report 2017 (Revised Version)

The results of the 2017 agricultural survey depict improved trends between livestock and crop production within the traditional sector. Livestock production especially cattle continued to decline in 2017, while arable production showed a marked improvement in all the major crops compared to the 2015 agricultural census results. The good performance of the crop sector is attributable to the good rains received during the 2017 agricultural season as well as the input subsidies provided by the government.



Botswana Selected Environmental Indicators Digest 2020

The highest electricity consumption was recorded in 2014 with 14.04 Pj. In terms of energy intensity, the water and electricity sector recorded the highest energy consumption measured by energy intensity during the period 2010 – 2017. The results show that during the years 2010 – 2018 about 92 percent of total electricity was generated from coal, while about 8 percent was from diesel. The year 2017 registered the highest total energy supply of 28.37 Pj. The annual final electricity consumption decreased from 2,310,662 MWh in 2010 to 2,275,409 MWh in 2017. The coal summary statistics show that both production and consumption saw a significant increase from 2010 to 2018.





The fixed telephone line subscriptions went down by 0.1 percent in Q1 2021. They fell from 140,003 which was registered in Q4 2020 to 139,930 in this quarter. Subscriptions on mobile cellular telephones recorded an increase. They rose from 3,829,408 registered in Q4 2020 to 3,876,773 in Q1 2021, thus increasing by 1.2 percent. Internet subscriptions also increased. They went up by 1.4 percent in Q1 2021, from 2,290,332 in Q4 2020 to 2,323,120.



The Index of Electricity Generation (IEG) stood at 140.3 during the first quarter of 2021, reflecting the year-on-year increase of 22.4 percent compared to 114.7 recorded during the corresponding quarter in 2020. The quarter-on-quarter comparison shows an increase of 14.0 percent, from 123.1 during the fourth quarter of 2020 to 140.3 during the current quarter.

The Index of Mining Production stood at 74.4 during the first quarter of 2021, showing negative year-on-year growth of 12.0 percent, from 84.6 registered during the first quarter of 2020. The main contributor to the decline in mining production came from the Diamonds sector, which contributed negative 11.7 percentage points as shown in Table 2. Soda Ash was the only positive contributor to the mining production, contributing 0.1 of a percentage point. However, its contribution was insignificant to offset the negative contribution made by Diamonds.




International Merchandise Trade Statistics Annual Report 2017/18

Botswana received imports amounting to P64, 569.7 million in 2018, having increased by 16.9 percent from the value of P55, 217.5 million in 2017. Exports amounted to P67, 209.4 million in 2018, showing a rise of 9.0 percent from the value of P61, 673.3 million recorded in 2017. The country registered a trade surplus of P2, 639.7 million in 2018, compared to a trade surplus of P6, 455.8 million in 2017. In 2018, the top three imported commodity groups were Diamonds at 28.4 percent, Fuel at 13.2 percent, and Machinery & Electrical Equipment at 13.1 percent. The top exported commodity groups were Diamonds at 89.9 percent, Machinery & Electrical Equipment at 2.9 percent, and Meat and Meat Products at 1.4 percent.

The results showed that 74.5 percent of the households in Botswana believed that Botswana is not a poor country while 21.9 percent believed that it is a poor country. The remaining 3.5 percent and 0.2 percent were in the category “don’t know” and those who did not state their opinion respectively.



Vital Statistics Report 2019

A total of 67,430 live births were registered in 2019 out of which 54,100 were live births from the current year (2019). It shows that 80 percent of the live births that were registered in 2019 were current while the remaining 20 percent were non-current (occurrences from previous years). Of all the non-current births registered, 67.5 percent are those aged less than 17 years, an indication that the need for registration documents to access social services compel parents or guardians to register their children's births.

In March 2021, Botswana's total imports were valued at P 8, 965,098,062. In this amount, food imports contributed P 881,176,709.8, representing 9.8 percent. Beverages, Spirits, and Vinegar accounted for 21.0 percent of food imports, followed by Sugars and sugar confectionery and Preparations of cereals with 9.5 percent and 8.6 percent respectively.

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

In May 2021, Botswana's total imports were valued at P 7,424,870,037.1. In this amount, Food Imports contributed P 823,832,439.6, translating to 11.1 percent. Beverages, spirits & Vinegar accounted for 20.3 percent of Food Imports, followed by Cereals and Preparations of cereals, flour, starch, or milk; pastry cooks' products with 14.7 percent and 7.6 percent, respectively.




Social Safety Nets Stats Brief

The results showed that 57.9% (387, 503) of the households received either of the social safety nets packages. Of the recipient households, 55.9% were female-headed, while 44.1% were male-headed households. This is consistent with all poverty survey results conducted in the country in the past, which indicated that poverty was more prevalent in female-headed households compared to male-headed households.



Cereals accounted for 17.6 percent of food imports, followed by Beverages, Spirits & Vinegar, and Sugars & Sugar Confectionery with 13.1 percent and 11.4 percent respectively.

Thirty-seven thousand, three hundred and fifty-two (37,352) mental Out-Patient disorder consultations were reported by health facilities in 2016. The majority of mental health consultations were from Gaborone with 19.1 percent followed by Francistown with 18.3 percent and Lobatse with 15.6 percent.



The fixed telephone line subscriptions declined by 3.9 percent in Q2 2021. They fell from 139,930 which was registered in Q1 2021 to 134,498 in this quarter. Subscriptions on mobile cellular telephones on the other hand increased. They rose from 3,876,773 registered in Q1 2021 to 3,911,833 in Q2 2021, thus increasing by 0.9 percent. The Internet subscriptions, as did fixed telephone subscriptions, decreased in Q2 2021. They went down by 3.2 percent in Q2 2021, from 2,323,120 in Q1 2021 to 2,249,137.

Botswana imported 47.8 percent of total electricity distributed during the second quarter of 2021. Eskom was the main source of imported electricity at 57.8 percent of total electricity imports. The Southern African Power Pool (SAPP) accounted for 17.8 percent, while the remaining 15.6, 4.6, and 4.2 percent were sourced from ZESCO, Nampower, and Cross-border electricity markets (Table 8). Cross-border electricity markets are an arrangement whereby towns and villages along the border are supplied with electricity directly from neighbouring countries such as Namibia and Zambia.

The Index of Mining Production stood at 85.6 during the second quarter of 2021, showing a year-on-year growth of 185.6 percent, from 30.0 registered during the second quarter of 2020. It was the first year-on-year positive growth recorded in the mining activity since the second quarter of 2019. The main contributor to the increase in mining production came from the Diamonds sector, which contributed 185.7 percentage points as shown in Table 2. Soda Ash was the only negative contributor to the mining production, at negative 0.5 of a percentage point.



The results presented in this brief show a decline in work permit holders from 3,895 in December 2020 to 3,523 in March 2021 a decrease of 9.6 percent. The Agricultural sector continues to record the majority of the work permit holders with 24.0 percent followed by Education with 15.4 percent. Work permit holders by age group showed that overall, the number of persons aged 40-44 was leading with 17.7 percent followed by age groups 35-39 and 45-49 recording 17.3 percent and 16.6 percent respectively.







The highest mean monthly maximum temperature recorded during the period October 2020 to March 2021 was for Tubu at 41.2 °C in October 2020, followed by Mababe at 38.9 °C in November 2020 and Tubu at 37.6 °C in October 2020. The highest maximum temperatures for the period were recorded for Tubu at 44.3 °C followed by 43.9°C and 43.9 °C, all recorded in November 2020.

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

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



The Mining Producer Price Index for Quarter 1 of 2021 was 72.2, registering a drop of 9.1 percent compared to 79.5 in Quarter 4 of 2020. The decrease was due to a fall in section indices of Gold, Diamond, Salt, and Soda Ash which recorded a decline of 15.0, 9.6, 2.2, and 2.1 percent respectively. Only coal recorded an increase of 10.1 while Quarry remained unchanged.

International Merchandise Trade Statistics 2021


Total Imports in 2021 were valued at P93, 116.5 million, having increased by 24.9 percent (P18, 555.9 million) from the P74, 560.5 million recorded during the year 2020. The increase in imports was mainly influenced by the upsurge in Diamonds and Chemical & Rubber Products having contributed 41.5 percent (P9, 567.9 million) and 25.5 percent (P1, 783.8 million) respectively. Total Exports Comparison for 2021 to that in of 2020 shows an increase of 67.2 percent (P33, 022.2 million) from P49, 115.5 million to P82, 137.7 million. The surge was mainly attributed to the increase in Diamonds, which contributed 71.2 percent (P30, 825.0 million) from P43, 304.5 million in 2020 to P74, 129.5 million registered in 2021.



Consumer Price Index 2021

The average annual inflation rate in 2021 stood at a significant 6.7 percent compared to the 2020 inflation rate of 1.9 percent. Contributing considerably to the 2021 average annual inflation rate were; Transport (with an annual average inflation rate of 12.3 percent), Second was Housing, Water, and Electricity. Gas & Other Fuels (7.7 percent), Food & Non-Alcoholic Beverages (6.0 percent), and Miscellaneous Goods & Services (5.4 percent).

The growth of Transport was driven by the Operation of Personal Transport which includes retail pump prices and the Purchase of Vehicles. While on the other hand, Materials for Maintenance & Repair of Dwellings was the leading factor in the growth of Housing, Water, Electricity. Gas & Other Fuels. Bread & Cereals hold relatively more weight in the Food Group, therefore becoming the lead force in the Group's inflation. When we zoom into Miscellaneous Goods & Services, the average annual inflation of Insurance stood at 6.2 percent.







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
