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PREFACE

This report presents the results of the 2005/06 Labour Force Survey (LFS). This is the third LFS to be conducted in Botswana; the first LFS was conducted in 1984/85. LFS is conducted every ten years. However, other yearly surveys provide broad categories and information on economic activities in Botswana.

The purpose of the LFS is to provide information on the economically active population. The main objective of collecting data on the economically active population is among others to provide basic information on the size and structure of Botswana's workforce.

Unlike the first and second Labour Force Surveys, the 2005/06 collected information from persons aged 7 years old and above while the previous surveys collected information from persons aged 12 years and above. The inclusion of the 7 years and above came about as a request from other stakeholders as to measure the extent of child labour in this country. The coding of the occupations was based on the 1988 International Standard Classification of Occupation (ISCO-88), whilst the definition of the informal sector is in accordance with the 1993 System of National Accounts (SNA -1993). Few questions were asked about the informal activities and migration status of the labour force as this survey was mainly designed to capture information on the labour force characteristics. A more detailed Informal Sector Survey fieldwork was conducted (April – August 2007).

The report is divided into the following sections; Section 1 deals with the population aged 12 years and above, whilst Section 2 is concerned with the currently employed population. Section 3 deals with the informal activities. Sections 4 deal with unemployed population while Section 5, 6 and 7 present underemployment, Children's economic activities and household characteristics respectively. Definitions of concepts used are given at the back of the report together with details on methodology and coverage.

All efforts have been made to include as many tables as possible in the report, but given the nature of this survey we could not accommodate all users' needs. However, users are free to request for more detailed tables according to their needs.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to all those who made the 2005/06 Labour Force Survey possible. To mention but a few, the general public who provided the necessary information; field staff, CSO staff, Technical Working Group, Reference Group members, who tirelessly worked throughout the entire period; district and town/city council officials; and all those whom I have not mentioned whose input led to the successful completion of the survey.

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1. BACKGROUND AND SURVEY OBJECTIVES

1.1 Background

The Labour Force Survey (LFS) collects information on the economically active population. Unlike the previous two Labour Force Surveys, the 2005/06 collected information from persons aged 7 years old and above while the previous surveys collected information from persons aged 12 years and above. The inclusion of the 7 years and above came about as a request from other stakeholders as to measure the extent of child labour in this country if any. The survey also collected information on informal sector activities.

The economically active population can be classified into three mutually exclusive and exhaustive categories of the employed, unemployed and not in the labour force. The employed and unemployed together form the labour force which gives a measure of the number of persons furnishing the supply of labour for the production of goods and services at a given point in time.

Information from Labour Force Surveys is needed for measuring the extent of the available and unused human resources for the purpose of monitoring human resources development planning. It also provides information on the relationship between employment, income and other social and economic characteristics for formulating and monitoring employment policies and programmes; income generating and maintenance schemes; vocational training and other similar programmes.

Labour Force Surveys in Botswana are currently carried out every ten years. The last Labour Force Survey conducted in Botswana by the Central Statistics Office was in 1995/6. Thereafter, it was decided that there was a need to conduct a regular Labour Force Surveys as part of CSO on-going household survey program. The 1995/6 and 2005/6 were mid-census period update on the economic activity situation of the population. The LFSs provide much more in-depth information than censuses.

1.2 Survey Objectives

The broad objective of the survey was to obtain comprehensive data on the status of the labour market prevailing in Botswana.

More detailed objectives were;

- To provide measures of both current and usual economic activity.
- To obtain a measure of the size of employment in both formal and informal sector.
- To provide measures of unemployment and underemployment.

- To estimate the extent of child labour, obtain child employment activities and reasons for working.
- To estimate total population for the period.

The survey data would provide, among others, baseline information on indicators of employment and unemployment levels, and information necessary that can be used to develop, manage, evaluate and report on labour market policies.


1.2 Topics covered in the Survey

The following topics were agreed through consultation with stakeholders to form broad basis for addressing the objectives of the survey;

2. POPULATION 12 YEARS AND ABOVE

The below diagram provides information on population 12 years and above, divided into currently economically active and currently not economically active. The currently economically active comprised of persons who during a specified reference period, prior to the interview were either employed or unemployed. This is also known as the Labour Force. Not economically active population comprises of all persons not classified as either employed or unemployed.



The number of persons aged 12 years and above estimated through the 2005/06 Labour Force Survey totaled 1,153,227, out of which 518,733 (45.0 percent) were males and 634,495 (55.0 percent) were females. The majority (50.9 percent) of these were aged between 12 and 29 years. The number of senior citizens who qualifies for the old age pension (65 years +) stood at 94,989 or 8.2 percent of all persons aged 12 years and above. Amongst these (i.e. the 65 years and above) 66.8 percent were found in rural areas and females accounted for 57.5 percent of the total (Table H8).

The enumerated population of persons aged 12 years and above consisted of 787,962 (68.3 percent) economically active (labour force as it is commonly called) and 365,266 (31.7 percent) not economically active population. The not economically active population is made up of students, retired persons, sick and housework, whilst the economically active consists of the unemployed and the employed. Amongst the labour force (economically active) 539,150 were employed. The unemployed consisted of 114,042 actively seeking work and 134,770 discouraged job seekers.

3. CURRENTLY EMPLOYED

Employed persons refers to those who did some work in the reference period either for payment in cash or in kind (paid employees) or who were in self employment for profit or family gain as well as persons temporarily absent from these activities but definitely going to return to them (e.g. on leave or sick). Some work was defined as one hour or more in the reference seven days. It should be noted that any economic work took precedence over all other activities. The employment statistics analysis was based on those who were aged 12 years and over.

3.1 Currently Employed by Industry

Currently employed persons totaled 539,150 of which 281,762 were males and 257,388 (47.7 percent) females. The main industrial employers were Agriculture (29.9 percent), Wholesale and Retail Trade (14.4 percent), Public Administration (11.2 percent), Education (8.0 percent), and Manufacturing (6.7 percent). Foreign Missions were the least with 895 employees representing 0.2 percent of the total employment. The latter happens to be employing fewer persons because the number only included Batswana working in these foreign missions, while diplomats and their families were excluded from this survey (Table M1).

Females are increasingly dominating in most industries, the largest being Hotels and Restaurants at 74.3 percent followed by Private Households with 71.4 percent. Females in Education, Finance, Wholesale and Retail Trade & Health employment all accounted for more than 60 percent each. Males dominated in industries such as Mining (88.0 percent) followed by Construction (83.8 percent). Significant numbers of males were also recorded in industries such as Transport and Communication (65.4 percent), Water & Electricity (63.1 percent), Real Estate (61.6 percent) and Agriculture (61.2 percent).

The majority of persons (44.6 percent) were employed in rural villages, followed by Cities/towns with 29.5 percent. Urban villages constituted 25.9 percent of the employed persons. Agriculture dominated the rural employment by 56.1 percent and stood at 30.0 percent of the total employment. In urban Villages, most of the persons (19.1 percent) were employed under Retail Trade industry, followed by Public Administration with 15.0 percent. Retail Trade recorded the highest (17.5 percent) number of employees in Towns/Cities, followed by Public Administration with 13.4 percent (Table M1).

3.2 Currently Employed by Sector

Private sector was leading with 232, 492 employees representing 43.1 percent followed by subsistence farming with 24.0 percent. The government (Central & Local) was the third largest employer in the economy with 111, 540 employees or 20.7 percent of the total employment. Non-Governmental Organization recorded the least (0.6 percent) number of employees (Table 1).

The distribution of employment by region (Table M3) indicates that Private Sector had almost equal number of employees recorded under Urban Villages (36.0 percent) and Cities/Towns (35.0 percent). About 41.3 percent of Government employment was in Cities and Towns, while 82.1 percent of Subsistence Farming employees were from Rural Villages. The Rural Villages also accounted for a significant number of employees (67.5 percent) under the Private Households as compared to other regions.

The distribution of employees by sex indicates that females were slightly higher (51.9 percent) among Government employees as compared to males. The Private sector had almost equal distribution, 50.1 percent males and 49.9 percent females. Parastatal was a male dominated sector with 63.8 percent of its work force being males. On the other hand, males dominated the Private Households Sector, with about 56.2 percent of total employment in this sector (Table 1).

3.3 Currently Employed by Occupation

The most common occupations were Skilled Agricultural workers accounting for 25.3 percent followed by Elementary Occupations and Services/Sales workers with 19.0 and 16.8 percent of the total employment respectively. The majority of Agric Workers (81.7 percent) and Elementary Occupations (50.5 percent) were more concentrated in rural areas. Urban Villages recorded more Service Workers (40.0 percent) than other two regions. As expected, the majority of Legislators were found in Cities/Towns.

The female dominated occupations were Clerical (76.0 percent), Services and Sales workers (65.1 percent) and technicians/associate professionals (59.6 percent). The high number of females in the technical/Associate Professionals is due to the large number of female nurses and teachers (Table M 2).

4. INFORMAL SECTOR

According to the definition given by 1993 ILO International Conference of Labour Statistician (ICL-93): The Informal Sector units/enterprises typically operate at low level of organization, with little or no division between labour and capital as factors of production. Expenditure for production is often indistinguishable from household expenditure. Similarly, capital goods such as buildings or vehicles may be used indistinguishably for business and household purposes. Labour relations, where they exist are based mostly on casual employment, kinship or personal and social relations rather than contractual arrangements with formal guarantees. Furthermore, these units are not registered under specific forms of national legislation. There is no complete set of accounts maintained. The upper size limit (number of employees or value added) in the definition of enterprises may vary between countries. In Botswana, the number of employees per establishment is five (5) or less.

4.1 Informal Sector as Main Activity

There were 77,392 Informal Sector employees enumerated during the survey. The majority (50.8 percent) were self-employed without employees, followed by Paid employees and unpaid family helpers with 22.0 and 16.3 percent respectively. Women accounted for 60.5 percent of the informal sector employees, and most of these (60.3 percent) women were self-employed both with and with no employees.

4.2 Informal Sector as Main Activity by Industry

The largest employer was Wholesale & Retail Trade with 35,127 or 45.4 percent of the total employment, followed by Manufacturing with 15.5 percent. Fishing industry was the least recording 0.1 percent. Among the 35,127 Wholesale & Retail Trade employees, 65.2 percent were self-employees from both with and without employees. Women dominated the Retail Trade employees by 55.5 percent of the total employed under the industry.

4.3 Informal Sector as Main Activity by Age Group

Informal sector employment by age group indicates that most of the workers (73.0 percent) were aged between 15 and 44 years. A substantial proportion (57.4 percent) of this age group (15-44) were found in urban centres. Women constitute about 59.3 percent of the total informal sector employment amongst the 15-44 years age group.




Figure 1: Number Employed in the Informal Sector as Main Activity

5. UNDER-EMPLOYMENT

The under-employment covers all persons who worked for less than 35 hours and also reported that they were available to work more hours. The 35 hours limit was taken as it is close to the normal working hours of most government employees.

5.1 Currently Under-Employed

The number of persons who reported that they were currently under-employed stood at 24,914, representing 4.6 *percent* of the total currently employed (539,087). Amongst these 24,914 persons, 10,260 were males (41.2 percent) and 14,654 females (58.8 percent). Under-employment was more prevalent among rural dwellers and urban villages (58.2 and 29.8 percent respectively) compared to their Cities/towns counterparts (12.0 percent). Overall, the number of under-employed persons in both urban villages and rural areas was over half (90.0 percent) of the total under-employed.

Under-employed by hours worked indicated that the majority (71.1 percent) of the under-employed worked between 15 and 34 hours per week. Individuals who worked between 1 and 9 hours accounted for only 16.4 percent of the total.

Under-employment was more prevalent amongst persons who completed primary school and junior secondary with 8,368 (33.6 percent) and 7,768 persons (33.2 percent) respectively. The least affected group was those who completed non-formal education with 233 persons. Among those completed primary school, 65.1 percent were females. The majority (20.3 percent) of them were 45-49 years old.

6. CURRENTLY UNEMPLOYED

Unemployed persons were those individuals who did not do any work in the reference period (last 7 days) either for payment in cash or kind or who were not in self-employment for profit or family gain. This excludes individuals who were temporarily absent from the above-mentioned activities and were definitely going to return to them.

The unemployment population consisted of two groups;

Unemployed A: Persons currently unemployed who were not only available for work but had taken active steps to find work in the last 30 days preceding the interview. *Normally referred as actively seeking work.*

Unemployed B: Persons currently unemployed who have not taken active steps to find work in the last 30 days (*discouraged job seekers*).

The 2005/6 overall unemployment rate was 17.5 percent, lower than the 21.5 percent during the 1995/96 Labour Force Survey. It should be noted that these estimates relate to those individuals who were actively seeking work during the reference period (Unemployed A). Unemployment rate for the discouraged job seekers only (Unemployed B) stood at 17.1 percent. However, including the actively seeking work raises the total unemployment rate to 31.6 percent. Nonetheless, the mostly used or internationally recorded measure of unemployment is for the actively seeking work (17.5 percent). The most affected age groups are the 15-19 and the 20-24: recording unemployment rates of 26.7 and 34.9 percent respectively among the actively seeking work. Including the discouraged job seekers, the estimates are 53.7 and 49.1 percent respectively.

Unemployment by sex shows that in both the actively seeking work and the discouraged job seekers, more females (55.4 and 68.4 percent respectively) are unemployed than males. Most of the unemployed are found in urban centers (57.2 percent). These could be due to migration of the population from rural areas to the urban areas for better opportunities.

6.1 Currently unemployed (Total Unemployment – A+B)

The total unemployed population was 248,812 out of which 114,042 or 45.8 percent fell under A (i.e. actively seeking work) and 54.2 percent were the discouraged job seekers. Unemployment was more prevalent among the age group, 20 – 24 years, which constituted 26.5 percent, followed by age group 25 – 29 with 18.0 percent. Those aged 15-34 years accounted for 69.0 percent of the total unemployed during the 2005/6 Labour Force Survey.

Distribution by sex indicates that the majority of the unemployed were women, 155,417 or 62.5 percent of the total unemployed. The most affected female age group was youth 15–34, which recorded 68.5 percent. The least unemployed figures were recorded for the 12-14 years old with 0.3 percent. This is expected because most of them are still attending school. The unemployed were more concentrated in urban than rural areas. Overall, there were 142,240 (57.2 percent) unemployed persons in urban areas, and most of these were aged between 15 and 34 years.

Amongst those who were actively seeking work (Unemployed A), 55.4 percent were women. The majority of these job seekers (32.4 percent) were in the age group 20 – 24 years. Females, with 68.4 percent, dominated the discouraged job seekers. Across all the unemployed categories, urban centers had more unemployed than rural areas and mostly were women.

6.2 Currently unemployed by occupation of previous employment

Of the 248,812 total unemployed, 174,053 or 70.0 percent had at one stage in the past worked as paid employees or self-employed. The 174,053 consist of 84,941 active jobseekers and 89,112 discouraged jobseekers.

Distribution of these previous workers by their previous occupation shows that 19.1 percent of these were engaged in traditional agriculture. The second most common occupation was Domestic, maids & cleaners at 13.8 percent, followed by Construction, Maintenance & Labour work at 11.4 percent. Very few of them were Administrators/Managers, 0.1 percent of the total. Half the numbers of Traditional Agriculture workers were in rural areas. Of the 23,981 Domestic Maids & Cleaners, almost all, 95.9 percent were females. Overall, the unemployment is prominent in urban area than rural.

A significant number of Traditional agricultural workers were recorded under all categories of unemployed (A & B). Administrators/Managers was the least common (less than one percent) occupation among the actively seeking work population.

6.3 Currently unemployed by Industry of Previous Employment

Most of the persons, who at one stage in their lifetime had employment, were found in Traditional Agriculture. The industry contributed 35,196 (20.2 percent) of the 174,053 previous workers.

The other most common industries were Private Households (12.0 percent); Building Construction (11.1 percent); and wholesale & retail trade (10.0 percent). A significant number of Building construction and Wholesale & retail trade employer industry were found in urban areas.

Female workers dominated the traditional Agriculture sector (19.1 percent) followed by those in Private Households with 18.2 percent. Generally, Urban centres constituted as larger number of employees as compared to Rural areas.

6.4 Currently Unemployed by Previous Sector of Employment

Table 2 shows the currently unemployed by sector of previous employment, region and sex. Private sector contributed 45.2 percent employees to the total employment (174,053). Most of these workers (65.2 percent) were found in urban areas. Females were more concentrated in urban centers while man in rural areas. Own Lands, Farm and Cattle posts contributed 18.7 percent. These previous workers were evenly distributed in both locations. The unemployed persons who were once employed by Government accounted for 14.8 percent of the total. Only about 13.3 percent of the persons unemployed once worked in the Private Households, with more than half of these jobs found in the urban areas. A small proportion worked either as self-employed with employees or unpaid family workers.

Amongst the actively seeking work, 54.0 percent of these once worked in the Private Sector, whilst 14.5 percent once worked in Own Lands, Farm and Cattlepost. The majority (36.8 percent) of the discouraged job seekers once worked in the Private Sector as well.

6.5 Currently unemployed by duration looking for Work

In the currently unemployed by duration, 46,898 persons reported that they have been seeking work for more than two years. This represents 41.1 percent of the total unemployed. Those who disclosed that they have been looking for work for more than 6 months but less than two years accounted for 29.8 percent, whilst those who reported that they spent less than 6 (six) months were 32,799 (28.8 percent).

Amongst those persons who spent more than two years looking for work, 58.5 percent were females, and most of them were urban residents. Of the total 114,042 who reported the duration of looking for work, 76,513 (67.1 percent) of them were found in urban areas.

More than eighty (80) percent of those seeking work indicated that they were looking for paid employment. Out of the 98,736 who said they were looking for paid employment, 67.1 percent were in urban centres. Females accounted for 55.4 percent of those who were looking for paid employment. The number of those who reported that they wanted to start an Agricultural business (self-employment) was 1,755. This represents 1.2 percent of the total (114,042). More job seekers were found in urban areas, mostly women.

6.7: Currently Unemployed by Education Level

Those individuals who completed junior secondary dominated the currently unemployed with 36.3 percent, followed by primary and secondary completers with 25.5 and 21.6 percent respectively. The unemployed who never attended school accounted for 13.8 percent.




Figure 2: Currently Unemployed by Educational Level

Persons who completed non-formal and currently unemployed constituted 1.1 percent of the total unemployed.

The majority (155,417) of the currently unemployed were women, with 38.6 percent having completed junior secondary school only. Female primary completers constituted 26.1 percent, while those who completed senior secondary contributed 20.4 percent of all currently unemployed females.

Overall, most of those who completed junior secondary were found in urban centres. There were 55,080 compared to 35,178 in rural areas. The number of those completed Senior Secondary was higher (41,675) in urban than in rural areas (12,037). For the

Primary Education completers, rural centres emerged with a higher proportion of 53.5 percent.

6.8 Currently unemployed by Training Level

Among the currently unemployed population, 69.5 percent had no training at all, 16.6 percent were certificate holders, 7.7 percent had diplomas and 5.5 percent were degree graduates.

The majority (58.0 percent) of unemployed degree holders were males while among the diploma holders were females (53.2 percent). The certificate holders' unemployed females were higher (55.4 percent) than males.

By region most of the degree, diploma and certificate holders were in urban areas contributing 90.6, 80.1 and 72.3 percent respectively. The male degree and certificate holders constituted 58.5 and 55.4 percent respectively while the majority (55.2 percent) of diploma unemployed graduates were females (Table U21).

7. CHILDREN IN ECONOMIC ACTIVITIES

The total of number of children (7-17 years) engaged in economic activity was estimated at 38, 375 out of a total of 427,977 children in the same age bracket. Thus 9.0 percent of the children reported as working. Of the 38,375 working children, 23,304 were males (60.7 percent) and 15,828 (39.3 percent) were females.

7.1 Employment by Age

Of the 38,375 working children, 34 267 (89.3 percent) were aged between 10 and 17. Male children in the same age group constituted 61.3 percent of the working children. Among the 10-17 years old working children, about 60 percent were aged 10 to 14 years. This was similar for both males and females. About forty-nine (49) percent of working children were aged between 7 and 13 years old. According to Botswana Employment Act, no child less than 15 years shall be employed in any capacity what so ever. However, a child aged 14 years and is not attending school may be employed on light work not harmful to his/her health or development.

7.2 By Region

Majority of working children were found in Rural Villages at 64.9 percent compared to 25.6 and 9.5 percent in Urban Villages and Rural Villages respectively. The number of working children in rural villages constituted 12.6 percent of the total number of children. There were not much difference between Urban Villages, Cities&Towns, which accounted for 6.1 and 5.1 percent respectively.

At district level, Central Serowe/Palapye and Central Tutume reported almost double the number of working children (14 percent each) compared to other districts. Kweneng East came second followed by Ngwaketse, Central Mahalapye and Central Bobonong at 7.4, 7.3, 7.0 and 6.6 percent respectively (Table C6).

7.3 Industry and Occupation

Agriculture was the major employer of children at 66.0 percent, with Retail Trade coming second at 22.1 percent followed by Private households at 4.1 percent.

A large number of children worked as Agricultural workers, 62.5 percent followed by those who worked as Service workers at 22.4 percent. Of the 25,312 children who worked in Agricultural industry, 94.8 percent worked in Subsistence agriculture (Table C10).

Table C8 shows working children by usual hours worked and occupation. Most of the children who worked as Agricultural workers (79.2 percent) worked between 1- 28 hours per week, that is, 1-4 hours per day, compared to 64.6 percent of the Service workers. The picture changes when it comes to Elementary workers, 54.8 percent of children who worked as Elementary workers worked for 29 or more hours a week, that is more that 4 hours a day. A significant number of them worked for over 42 hours a week, thus over 7 hours a day.

8. ECONOMICALLY NOT ACTIVE POPULATION

The total currently not economically Active population were 365,266, out of which 143,718 were males and 221,548 were females. The 15-19 age-group constituted the largest proportion of the economically not active population (29.6 percent). This was followed by the 12-14 age-group with 27.7 percent. These two age groups consist mostly of persons who were attending school. Among the economically not active population who were looking after the sick, 90.1 percent were females and the majority of them were in the 65 and over age group. Persons in all the age groups, for both males and females, did household duties. However, as expected females were more involved in household duties than males (Table N 1).

The unmarried not active population accounted for 74.7 percent. A large proportion (72.0 percent) of these unmarried persons were attending school, followed by those doing household duties (9.3 percent). Persons looking after the sick constituted the least proportion of the unmarried. Amongst the married economically not active population, 64.5 percent were females and most of them (89.8 percent) were doing household duties (Table N 2).

Out of the 365,266 economically not active persons, 54.4 percent were attending school, 29.3 percent had left school and 17.3 percent had never attended school. Amongst those who left school, 46.2 percent left at primary level, 26.2 percent at senior secondary level, 24.5 percent at junior level and 3.1 percent at non-formal education level.

Most of the economically not active (92.4 percent) had no training and 61.1 percent of them were females (Table N 4).

Kweneng East district contributed the largest proportion (12.0 percent) of the not economically active population, followed by the Central Serowe/Palapye district with 11.1 percent. Sowa, Orapa and Jwaneng contributed the least proportion of the economically not active population with 0.1 percent, 0.4 percent and 0.5 percent respectively.

9. HOUSEHOLD CHARACTERISTICS

Overall there were 514,804 households recorded in the 2005/06 Labour Force Survey, of which 266,191 (51.7 percent) were male-headed and 248,613 (48.3 percent) female-headed. About 45.0 percent of these households were in rural areas. For the 248,613 female-headed households, 111,665 (44.9 percent) were in rural areas.

Distribution by employment status indicates that about 216,454 (42.0 percent) of the households had at least one of its members in a paid employment. Of these paid employees, 79,640 (36.8 percent) were urban dwellers. Females constituted 39.6 percent of the total paid employees. The Self-employed households accounted for 7.5 percent. Females accounted for 51.9 percent of the self-employed, 20,125 out of the 38,811.

Of the 514,804 households enumerated, 306,062 (59.4 percent) did not have any member engaged in paid employment. Households having at most one member as a paid employee accounted for 33.3 percent of the total, whilst at most two members constituted 6.3 percent of the total. Amongst 306,062 households without any wage earner, 164,944 (53.9 percent) were located in rural areas.

About a quarter (131,416) of the household heads have stated that they had never attended school, whilst who completed primary, Junior and Senior schools accounted for 29.2, 20.2 and 21.7 percent respectively. A significant proportion (21.3 percent) of the household heads who had never attended school had at least one member in their households.

APPENDICES

A. DEFINITION OF CONCEPTS

<u>Currently Economically Active</u> (the labour force) - Persons who were either employed or unemployed, as defined below, in the reference week.

Employed Persons - Persons who did some work in the reference period either for payment in cash or kind (paid employees) or who were in self employment for profit or family gain, plus persons temporarily absent from these activities but definitely going to return to them (e.g. on leave or sick). Self-employment includes the large number of persons working on their own lands or cattleposts. Unpaid family workers in family businesses are included. Some work was defined as 1 hour or more in the reference seven days. It should be noted that any economic work took priority over all other activities.

<u>Unemployed Persons</u> - Persons who were not employed as defined above and who stated that they were available for work.

<u>Currently Not Economically Active</u> (not in the labour force) - Persons who were neither employed nor unemployed in the reference period. This includes persons doing solely unpaid domestic work in their own house, studying or not working because they were sick or retired. Note that persons with these activities are included as economically active if they did any economic activity as defined above, in the reference period.

<u>Unemployed A</u> are persons currently unemployed who were not only available for work but had taken active steps to find work in the last 30 Days.

<u>Unemployed B</u> are persons currently unemployed who have not taken active steps to find work in the last 30 days (*discouraged job seekers*).

<u>Unemployment</u> - It was decided not to restrict the unemployed to those both without work and actively seeking work. The Botswana labour market is largely unorganized. There are few labour exchanges and particularly in rural areas, it is often a meaningless activity to be actively seeking work. It was decided to use the broader and more applicable (and understandable) concept of being available for work. This relaxation of international recommendations is allowed. However it was decided to ask additional questions and produce the sub-sets of the unemployed as given above, i.e. $\underline{\mathbf{A}}$ - available and actively seeking, $\underline{\mathbf{B}}$ - available but not actively seeking. Concept $\underline{\mathbf{A}}$ is mostly applicable in urban areas. It was decided to use four weeks as the limit for actively seeking as it is a reasonably short period but also allows more time, given the state of the labour market. As will be seen in the tabulations, about 45 percent of persons categorized as Unemployed B said they were not actively looking for work as they

thought none was available. The Unemployed B rate is thus mostly a measure of discouraged job seekers in the Botswana imperfect labour market.

<u>Under-employment</u> - Under-employed persons by hours are persons who worked less than 35 hours in the reference week for an economic reason (i.e. excluding those on leave, at school and similar non-economic reasons) and who said they were available for more work. These are often called 'visibly under-employed'. The 35 hours limit was taken as it is close to the normal working hours of most government and private employees. Persons who feel their qualifications are not being used are under-employed in a broader sense.

<u>Temporary absences from employment</u> - This covers persons not working in the reference period but having work from which they are temporarily absent. Such a person is included in the employed population provided they keep a strong attachment to the job and there is a definite expectation he/she will return to it. The most common categories are persons on leave from a wage job.

<u>Usually Employed</u> - Persons who were usually economically active and spent half or more of the economically active months, working.

The derivation of the categories above was quite complex, but was done on the computer once data was fully edited. The key information is the totals in each category from Q4 of the questionnaire. The categories are.

A - no. of months working all month (Q5 YES was made 12 for A)

B - no. of months working part month and available for work

C - no. of months working part month and not available for work

D - no. of months not working at all and available for work

E - no. of months not working at all and not available for work.

We assumed:-

- (i) That part months on average were half a month. (This has been done in other countries)
- (ii) That when a person was working part of a month and available for work part of a month, this was half a month each. (See B).
- (iii) That when a person is not working and is available for work, it is the whole month (See D).

The major derivations are:-

- * Persons Usually Economically Active A + D + B + C/2 > or = 6
- * <u>Person Usually Employed</u> Economically Active and

$$A + (B + C)/2 > or = D + B/2$$

- * Persons Usually Unemployed Economically active and A + (B + C)/2 < D + B/2.
- * Persons Usually not Economically Active E + C/2 > 6
- * Usually Employed with some Unemployment
 Usually employed and
 B or D > 0

Other useful concepts which were derived and tabulated are.

- * Persons Employed at all during 12 months

 Economically Active or not Active and

 A, B or C > 0
- * Persons Unemployed at all during 12 months

 Economically Active or not Active and
 B or D > 0

<u>Paid Employees</u> are persons who during the reference week performed some work for a wage or salary in cash or kind or were temporarily absent from such work. Permanent, temporary and casual paid employees were also included.

<u>Self Employed</u> (*Non Traditional Agriculture*) are persons who during the reference week performed some work for profit or family gain (not on their own lands or cattlepost) or were temporarily absent from such work. This includes small and large businessmen working on their own enterprises. The category can be sub-divided into self employment with or without employees.

<u>Unpaid Family Helpers</u> (*Non Traditional Agriculture*) are persons working completely without payments in cash or kind in family enterprises. Such workers on their own lands or cattlepost are not included here.

<u>Traditional Agriculture Workers</u> are persons working on their own lands or cattlepost either in agriculture, livestock or fishing as either self employed persons or as unpaid family helpers.

The major variation of the commonly used international classification of status in employment, is the provision of the special category for traditional agriculture workers. These are often combined with the self employed. However it was decided that the separate category was very desirable for the LFS as the non agricultural self employed can easily be lost in the dominant agricultural group.

<u>Central Government</u> - Refers to persons working for all Central Government. This includes all Teachers in Government Primary and Secondary schools (including community secondary schools) plus food stampers and night watchmen in schools.

<u>Local Government</u> - Includes persons working for District and Urban Councils. There are a few pre-schools under Local Government. Persons employed on drought relief projects are included under Local Government.

<u>Parastatals</u> - includes the wide range of enterprises owned at least 50% by the government, either profit making or non-profit making.

<u>Traditional Agriculture</u> - includes all persons who stated that they were working on their own or family lands or cattlepost either in agriculture, livestock or fishing or as paid employees on similar establishments.

<u>Informal Sector(IS)</u> - According to the 2005/06 LFS definitions, an establishment/unit qualified to be of an informal activity if it satisfied the following criteria.

- Not registered company
- ❖ Not registered with professional association
- ❖ Less than 5 employees
- ❖ Informal accounts or none
- ***** Expenditure not easily distinguishable from household expenditure
- Employees casually hired
- Often temporary or mobile or in owner's home/plot

Also included under informal sector were domestic servants and other private households workers. Nonetheless, these are separately identified (Please note that traditional agriculture is not part of the informal sector).

<u>Other Private</u> - includes persons working for other enterprises not included above. This is broadly often called the private formal sector. It should be noted that persons working for NGOs are also included in this group

B. SURVEY METHODOLOGY

1. OBJECTIVES

The survey was designed to obtain comprehensive data relating to status of the Botswana current labour market, which include measurement of the following:

- i. Current and usual economic activity;
- ii. Size of employment in both formal and informal sector;
- iii. Unemployment and underemployment, and
- iv. Number of children of under age in the prevailing labour market (commonly called Child labour); etc.

2. TARGET POPULATION

Seven years and above population were targeted for usual and current economic activities.

3. SCOPE AND COVERAGE

Only private dwellings were within the scope of the survey. Institutional dwellings (prisons, hospitals, army barracks, hotels, etc), and completely industrial areas were not within the scope of the survey.

The non-citizen tourists who were in Botswana on holidays and not working here were also not included in the survey. Foreign tourists may, of course, be here as visitors to a selected household for the survey. In such cases they were treated as visitors, their names were recorded and the relevant questions were asked about them only at household level.

The coverage was nation-wide using administrative sub-districts that are usually used by the Central Statistical Office.

4. SAMPLING FRAME

In general the 2001 Population and Housing Census, undertaken in August, is the Sampling Frame on which sample selection for the Survey Programmes are based. The census result gives information on population, number of household at Locality, Enumeration Area (EA), village and district/town levels. Also given for each EA is information on ecological zones in rural areas.

The Sampling frame was defined and constituted by all Enumeration Areas (EAs) found in three geographical regions viz. (i) Cities & Towns (ii) Urban Villages¹, and (iii) Rural Districts as defined by the 2001 Population and Housing Census.

Being a two-stage design, two frames were required one for each stage.

The sampling frame for the first stage based on the 2001 Population and Housing Census. This comprised the list of all Enumeration Area (EA) together with number of households. In the census the EAs were frames of manageable size (in terms of dwellings/households).

The sampling frame for the second stage was produced only in the selected EAs. Before the beginning of the survey interviews, the field teams listed all private <u>habitable</u> dwellings/households in their EAs. Thus the number of occupied households in the selected EA served as sampling frame for that EA.

The frame for the Botswana Labour Force Survey 2005/6 consisted of 4,143 EAs being the total number of Enumeration Areas (EAs) delineated during the 2001 Population and Housing Census.

5. STRATIFICATION

When national level estimates are the main focus a type of stratification that is simple to implement and highly efficient is *implicit stratification*. It is a form of geographic stratification, which when used together with systematic *pps* sampling automatically distributes the sample proportionately into each of the nation's administrative subdivisions, as well as the urban and rural sectors.

Creation of strata is dictated by two principal criteria. These include a need to:

- i. provide estimates for each major region of the country.
- ii. increase precision

Thus, stratification variables included cities/towns and administrative districts.

Apart from national and rural estimates, the Government, which is the main user of CSO data, requires accurate estimates for all regions for planning and monitoring of development projects. Stratification was therefore undertaken such that all districts and major urban centres become their own strata. With regard to increase precision consideration was also given to group EAs according to ecological zones in rural districts and according to income categories in cities/towns.

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¹ These are villages each with a 2001 Census population of 5,000 or more and at least 75 percent of its workforce engaged in non-agricultural economic activities.

Geographical stratification along ecological zones and income categories was expected to improve the accuracy of survey data in view that homogeneity of the variables was relatively high (implicit stratification).

There are five major rural ecological zones, namely:

- -Village,
- -Lands
- -Cattle Post
- -Freehold Farms
- -Mixture of Land and Cattle Post

During the delineation of the maps, each EA was associated with unique ecological zone and thus, grouping the EAs into respective zones was not a problem. To facilitate the selection according to the stratification variables and EAs were listed in some order, for example starting cattle post, then farms etc. in case of rural areas.

6. SAMPLE SIZE AND ALLOCATION OF SAMPLE (HOUSEHOLDS) TO STRATA

The size of the sample is perhaps the most important parameter of the sample design, because it affects the precision, the cost and duration of the survey more than any other factor. With the other statistical determinants, the overall sample size for 2005/6 BLFS has also taken consideration the numbers of PSUs (EAs) and SSUs (households). After few revisions, it was decided to include around 9760 households in the sample.

Remarks: Two general rules of thumb govern the choice on numbers of PSUs (EAs) and SSUs (households): (i) the more PSUs, it is better, as both geographic representation, or spread, and overall reliability will be improved; and (ii) the smaller the number of SSUs, the more reliable estimates will be.

For 2005/6 BLFS the sample (households) was allocated into strata proportionally to the total number of household as per 2001 Census (see Table 1).

Remark: The EAs in the sample in each stratum were distributed equally over the 4 quarters of the year, such that seasonal variation in some of study variables could be minimised.

**Urban Villages: These are villages each with a 2001 Census population of 5,000 or more and at least 75 percent of its workforce engaged in non-agricultural economic activities. In total there are now 27 urban villages.

Stratum 8 (Urban Villages) is a derived stratum of EAs of Urban Villages of Rural Districts (Strata 9-27).

Remark: Complete rural district results will need the estimation of any urban small town or urban village component to add to the rural component.

7. SAMPLE DESIGN

A stratified two-stage probability sample design was used for the selection of the sample.

The **first stage** was the selection of EAs as Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) selected with probability proportional to measures of size (PPS), where measures of size (MOS) were the number of households in the EA as defined by the 2001 Population and Housing Census. In all 488 EAs were selected with probability proportional to size.

At the **second stage** of sampling, the households were systematically selected from fresh list of occupied households prepared at the beginning of the survey's fieldwork (i.e. listing of households for the selected EAs). Overall **9760** households were drawn systematically.

(a) First Stage: Sampling of EAs

In the first stage, the EAs were systematically selected with probability proportional to measures of size (PPS), where measures of size (MOS) were the number of dwellings/households in the EA as defined by the 2001 Population and Housing Census.

The procedure for selecting the EA in each stratum consists of:

(i) Calculating the sampling interval for the stratum:

$$I = \sum M_i / n$$

Where:

 \sum M_i is the size of the stratum (total number of households in the stratum according to 2001 Census) and 'n' is the number of EAs to be selected in the stratum.

(ii) Calculating the cumulated size of each EA.

- (iii) Calculating the sampling numbers R, R+I, R+2I,...,R+(n-1)I, where R is the random number between 1 and I.
- (iv) Comparing each sampling number with the cumulated size.

The EA to be selected was the first whose cumulated size was greater or equal to the sampling number.

(b) Second Stage: Sampling of Households

Upon completion of households listing, the household lists were carefully checked. Household numbers were assigned to each household in the EA, Vacant and non-residential structures and structures under construction were not numbered. The total number of households in the EA was the last household number assigned in the EA.

The listing operation was used mainly to update the measures of size at the EA level for second stage sampling.

The criterion for the number of households allocated in the EA was fixed because of administrative convenience and spread of sample over strata.

The Systematic selection of households consist of:

(i) Calculating the sampling interval for the selected EA:

I = M / m

Where;

M is the total number of occupied households listed in the selected EA and 'm' is the number of households to be selected in the EA.

(ii) Calculating the sampling numbers R, R+I, R+2I,...,R+(m-1)I, where R is the random number between 1 and I.

8. PUBLICITY FOR PUBLIC AWARENESS

Several methods were used to make Batswana aware of the survey viz.:

- i. Communication of information about the Survey to Regional and District Leaders was made.
- ii. Some small items, which were given to field workers for publicity purposes were: T-shirts, caps, bags and motorcar bumper stickers.

9. HOUSEHOLD AND INDIVIDUAL QUESTIONNAIRES

The questionnaires are the primary recording documents of the survey. In the development of the questionnaires, a reference group was formed to work into the questionnaire. The final version of the questionnaires were finalized on the basis of the experiences gained from the Pilot Survey conducted using the drafted questionnaires for the survey. The 2005/6 BLFS consisted of two questionnaires, namely

- i. The Household Questionnaire, and
- ii. The Individual Questionnaire

The Household Questionnaire

This questionnaire is a standardized questionnaire of the CSO's Household Survey Programme except with a little modification as per the need of the designated survey. This questionnaire also set the criteria for eligibility of being an BLFS individual questionnaire respondent.

The Household questionnaire was divided into **four** major sets of questions, namely

- i. Socio-Demographic Characteristics
- ii. Parental Survivor and Fostering
- iii. Education and Training

Eligibility Criteria was not a question asked by the respondent. It was meant for the interviewer to identify persons who were eligible for an individual questionnaire.

<u>Criteria</u>: "Those respondents who were aged 7 years and more and also usual members of this household were eligible for an individual respondent."

Individual Questionnaire

All the eligible individuals from the household questionnaire were asked questions on the individual questionnaire.

The process of individual questionnaire development was not a simple task. The challenge was to develop the types of questions that led to achieving the survey objectives. Standardised questionnaire were developed so as to provide the basis for current (where feasible) and future comparability. More specifically, questions and the design structure of the questionnaire took into full account a set of objectives spelt out above with a view to address them.

The individual questionnaire has the questions mainly on the following topics:

Section 1: For all persons aged 7 years and above A: Usual Activity.

B: Current Activity

Section 2: For all who did not work in the last 7 days and who were available for work (12 years and above)

Section 3: For all employed in the 7 days.

A: Main Economic Activity (for 7 years and above)

B: Secondary Activity (for 12 years and above)

C: Usual Hours Worked (for 7 years and above)

D: Actual Hours Worked (for 7 years and above)

E: Additional Work

F: Different Work

G: On the Job Training

H: Income from Employment Business

Section 4: Migration (For all persons aged 12 years and above)

Section 5: Housework and Work at School

Section 6: Health and Safety

10. PRE-TEST

The Botswana Labour Force Survey instruments (household and individual) were pretested in areas in and around Gaborone on the 14-16 April 2005. Households were selected at random from EAs belonging to different strata according to the stratification in the sample design.

11. TRAINING OF FIELD STAFF

- A team of 9 officers trained the field staff for the BLFS.
- Among the trainees 23 supervisors were trained over a period of three weeks (6-10 June and 13-24 June 2005).
- The other group of trainees were six-nine (69) people trained as enumerators over a period of two weeks (13-24 June 2005). Of these 69 people 28 were recruited as enumerators, among which 16 were designated for coding and editing duties.
- During the training, as a selection criterion, the trainees were subjected to a theoretical test followed by practical interviews involving real households. Translation of the questions into Setswana was practiced during the training because most of the interviews were conducted in local language, Setswana.

12. FIELD TEAMS

• There was 42 field staff, comprising 14 supervisors and 28 enumerators.

- Thirteen supervisors were on temporary contract whereas one was permanent Central Statistics Office staff.
- The teams comprised mainly of two enumerators and a supervisor.
- Each team had at least 1 vehicle with a driver.
- Each of the 14 teams was assigned at least 34 EAs during the course of the survey.
- Six officers who were responsible for the quality control.
- The survey data collection was conducted between 1st July 2005 and 31st of June 2006.

13. LISTING OF HOUSEHOLDS IN THE SELECTED EAS

Listing of the households in the EAs forms the sampling frame for the second stage of sampling of households and consequently affects the second stage sampling weight. During each round, each of the 14 teams listed all households in habitable permanent and private dwellings in their assigned EAs within a period of two days. Temporary dwellings such as tents, military barracks and school/institutional hostels were excluded. During listing households were identified as either 'Occupied' or 'Unoccupied'. From the list of occupied households the enumeration teams used Systematic Sampling procedure to select households. Precautions were observed that the household listing in the EA should be complete and no omission or duplication of listing of EAs is done.

14. QUALITY CONTROL

The quality control team during their field inspections identified some problems relating to recording and interpretation of questions. They advised the teams accordingly. Since most of the coding and editing exercise was done alongside the data collection, it was easy to contact the teams while they were still out in the field and make proper editing and coding of the items.

15. DATA COLLECTION

(i). Households Questionnaire: After listing the total households in the selected EAs, supervisors made the selection of occupied households and handed over the list of selected households to respective enumerators. After the introduction of the survey team to the Chief of the village or area, enumerators approached the selected households and informed the purpose of their visit to the Head of the household. Enumerators were trained to explain the main objective of the survey to the respondents and encouraged him/her for the participation in the most important and needed mission. Once the respondent was informed about the reason for the visit, enumerator recorded all the relevant information for those members who spent the night in the household. After administering the questionnaire, for the response of individual questionnaire enumerators identified those listed members in the household who fulfilled the criteria as laid down in the household questionnaire. In some cases it was not possible to administer the

household questionnaire at the first visit, then call back technique was applied to the maximum of three visits and the final result was recorded in the result box. One household questionnaire was administered for one selected household.

(ii) Individual Questionnaire: The individual questionnaire was filled for all the members of the households who qualified to be an individual respondent, that is those aged 7 years and more and were usual members of the household. In some cases it was not possible to administer the individual questionnaire at the first visit, then here also call back technique was applied to the maximum of three visits and the final result was recorded in the result box.

16. CALCULATION OF SAMPLING WEIGHTS

Being a multistage design, it follows naturally that the sample selected at each stage represents (or is assumed to) the respective population. The fundamental assumption was that units selected at each stage were similar to those not selected, in respect of characteristics of interest. In the treatment of unit for the non-response the assumption that the responders were similar to non-responders though should not be always taken for granted.

The weights of the sample are equal to the inverse of the probability of selection. Therefore the sampling probabilities at first stage of selection of EAs including probabilities of selecting the households were used to calculate the weights.

There are three components to the weighting:

(i) From EA to Stratum Level

First stage weights account for the varying probability of EA selection. That is they are proportional to the inverse of the size measure.

(iii) A Non-Response Adjustment

For the Botswana Labour Force Survey no substitution was allowed for non-response and household questionnaire had to be returned for all households, responded or not responded. The response codes and corresponding results were as follows:

Only non-contact and refusals were taken as non-response. The other sample loss was effectively taken as zero i.e. no one lived in these households. The non-response rate was made at the EA level. The adjustment was equal to the presumed total households in the EA (codes 1+2+4+5) divided by the presumed valid response in that EA (codes 1+5). In effect non-contacts and refusals were given the characteristics of average valid respondents in the EA.

17. DATA PROCESSING

Before data entry was carried out, questionnaires were edited to check if all the relevant questions have been responded to and coded according to the codes designed for the study. Editing and coding started in August 2005 by 19 Coders and finished in August 2006. Data entry was carried out under the supervision of one programmer/supervisor. Consistency checks on the data set as per the Computer edit Specifications were performed.

18. CONSTRAINT ANALYSIS: PROBLEMS IN FIELD OPERATIONS

Demarcation of some enumeration areas had not been done properly and from time-to-time teams especially those in urban villages had to call cartography unit to come and assist as most of the EAs were lumped/combined; therefore it was not easy to identify the boundaries. In such cases the enumerators were advised to list all dwellings within the boundaries and draw a sketch map indicating the dwelling numbers. After the completion of households listing they further divided the household accordingly by the number of combined EAs, and make selection from the selected EA. Some maps had been faintly printed therefore it was very difficult for teams to identify enumeration areas with such maps.

During the first round supervisors were encouraged to accompany enumerators during their visits. This helped in enumerators gaining the necessary confidence and also helped supervisors in monitoring of interviews. From then onwards, the team supervisors concentrated on monitoring survey resources and editing of questionnaires.

The enumeration area maps that were used were at least 5 years old and some areas dwellings did not exist anymore. Some of these dwellings were demolished by the Land Boards example of these are those dwellings at Mogoditshane, Ledumang, and Francistown etc. The floods, especially in the Central district also swiped some dwellings. This contributed to fewer households listed during the listing exercise.

Shortage of vehicles and continuous vehicles break down made it very difficult for the teams to do their work as expected. Efforts were made to try and arrange with the Central

Transport Organization (CTO) at the beginning of the survey to give the BLFS 2005/06 vehicles priority. Most of the vehicles that were used for the survey were very old. As soon as they were sent to CTO they were boarded and replacing a boarded vehicle took a long time.

(a) While efforts were made to ensure that the results are as accurate as possible, there will always be some underreporting. One should bear in mind that there are many opportunities of under-reporting; some sensitive questions will always be underreported.
