

1.0 Background and Commentary

The Population and Housing Census is the most representative form of enumeration since it covers as many people and topics as possible. It is the total enumeration of households and throughout the country. The census is carried out after every ten years in Botswana. This report covers indicators and counts of the 2011 Population and Housing Census (PHC) and makes comparisons, in some instances, with the previous census of 2001. There are two types of enumeration methods. One is de jure type and the other is de facto. De jure method refers to enumeration of population according to usual residence and excludes visitors but includes absent residents. De facto method, on the other hand, refers to enumeration of population according to where one spent the census night and it includes visitors but excludes absent resident. The 2011 PHC therefore used de facto enumeration.

An important aspect about the 2011 census is its wide disaggregation of information by important variables of sex, gender, locality among others. The disaggregation formed the basis of this report. The report presents information on localities with 500 or more inhabitants.

1.1 Background to the Report

This report was necessitated by the need for disaggregated data at all levels. Statistics Botswana with assistance of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) undertook work on producing a geographically disaggregated and gender sensitive information.

1.2 Importance of the report


Demographic and socio-demographic information is critical in the development efforts of a country. The tendency has been to produce national averages to represent the situation of all people within the countries. Hence, data on the district and locality level have not been fully published and used by the localities even when available. This masked the wide disparities in demographic, health and other socio-economic indicators within the country. The outlook of these, has therefore been overlooked hence conditions of large sections of the communities have remained largely unknown.

2.0 Total Population and growth

The total population of the Serowe/Palapye Sub District was 181,092 in 2011 which is a 19.2 percent increase from the 2001 count of 151,950. Serowe and Palapye are the largest villages with populations of 52,831 and 29,565 respectively, thereby contributing a combined 54.5 percent of the Sub District's population. The two villages experienced positive intercensal growths between 2001 and 2011 of 0.9 and 3.3 percent respectively. As an emerging industrial growth area, Palapye recorded an overall growth of 39.0 percent compared to 9.2 percent for Serowe.

Between 2001 and 2011 villages, within the referenced sub-district, experienced mixed rates of growth. Moeng village population increased four-fold at 477 percent followed by 'other localities' at 185 percent. It is worth noting that unlike the previous censuses which were conducted during school holidays, the 2011 Population and Housing Census was conducted when schools were in sessions. This led to schooling facilities like Moeng to record very high growth. Other villages which recorded significant growth included Mmashoro and Malatswai at 86 and 63.1 percent respectively. The villages of Motshegaletau, Mogapinyana, Tshimoyapula and Topisi experienced negative growth between the two censuses. Moeng on the other hand, recorded the highest intercensal growth of 17.5 percent.

The distributions in the above pictures show a broad base denoting a high proportion of infants and children up to the age of 19. These are children and youths of school going age up to senior secondary level. After the age of 14, there is a marked reduction of youth in the ages 19 years and above. These are probably youths in tertiary education which may not be provided in the sub district. In addition, some have moved to other centres in search of jobs and better opportunities for self-improvement.

3.0 Population Distribution

3.1 The Youth

The Serowe/Palapye Sub-District has a fairly young population. Though slightly below the national average, the youth aged 18 – 35 years constituted 29.8 percent of the district population. The bulk of the youth were found in Moeng, where 45.1 percent of the population was within the youth bracket. This is because Moeng is a schooling facility which accommodates mostly youth at senior secondary school level who, are found within above-saidage bracket. The village was closely followed by Palapye and Serowe with rates of 37.2 and 32.1 percent respectively. The availability of senior secondary schooling facilities and the improved economic activities within these localities in part explains the relatively young populations in the two villages.

3.2 The Elderly

The elderly population is described as those who are aged 65 years and above. This group constituted 6 percent of the district population which is above the national average of 5 percent. The villages of Gootau and Selowane had the highest proportion of the elderly population at 10.76 and 10.11 percent respectively, while Moeng had the lowest percentage of elderly population at 0.07 percent.

3.3 Labour Force

Labour Force refers to population aged between 15 and 64 years. The District had an economically active population (15 – 64 years) which is below the national average. While this group constituted 64.9 percent of the national population, it constituted 59.2 percent of the Serowe/ Palapye Sub-District population. The highest percentage of the economically active population was found in Moeng at 91.5 percent followed by Palapye and Serowe at 67.2 and 61.3 percent respectively. It should, however, be noted that most of the persons within this age in Moeng are students hence not economically engaged. The lowest proportions of persons within the economically active population were found in Malatswai and Matlhakola at 39.8 and 44.74 percent respectively. The scarcity of job opportunities in these localities may have contributed to migration of persons within this group to other areas in search of better employment opportunities.

3.4 Employment

Overall, unemployment rate for the Sub-District was estimated at 11.9 percent, which is below the national estimate of 19.9 percent. The highest rate was recorded in the village of Mogorosi at 22.0 percent followed by Moreomabеле at 19.6 percent and Diloro at 17.8 percent. Moeng had the lowest unemployment rate estimated at 1.0 percent. Other villages with significantly lower unemployment rate included Majwanadipitse and Dimajwe at 3.0 and 3.9 percent respectively.

3.5 School Enrolment


School enrolment is measured by those aged between 6 and 13 years who are either currently attending school, left school or had never attended school. The 2011 Population and Housing Census showed that there were more females than males on a ratio of 51 to 49 percent in the entire district. More than 90 percent of the school going population was still at school for the entire Serowe/ Palapye Sub District. An estimated 2.5 percent had left school and 2.8 percent had never attended. Additionally, 3.1 percent of males and 2.5 percent of female had never attended school.

Moeng had the highest proportion of those who were attending school at 100 percent, closely followed by Goosekgweng at 99.1 percent. The villages of Thabala and Moiyabana, on the other hand, had relatively low percentage of those attending school at 83 and 86 percent respectively. In addition, the two villages also had the highest percentage of those who had never attended school at 9.1 and 11 percent respectively.

4.0 Disability

Disability is an umbrella term, covering impairments, activity limitations, and participation restrictions. Impairment is a problem in body function or structure; an activity limitation is a difficulty encountered by an individual in executing a task or action; while a participation restriction is a problem experienced by an individual in involvement in life situations.

Disability is thus not just a health problem. It is a complex phenomenon, reflecting the interaction between features of a person's body and features of the society in which he or she lives. Overcoming the difficulties faced by people with disabilities requires interventions to remove environmental and social barriers.



Though disability across the district is generally low, with proportions below one percent, Figure 10 shows that the most common form of disabilities were defects of seeing on one or both eyes and hearing which affected 1.6 and 0.7 percent of the Sub District population respectively. Defects of seeing were common in Moreomabèle at 6.3 percent followed by Diloro with 5.9 percent. Other villages with significant proportion of persons with disabilities were Motshegaletau with 4.2 percent, Tamasane with 3.1 percent and Paje, Mabeleapudi and Thabala with 2.6 percent each.

People with disabilities have the same health needs as non-disabled people – for immunization, education and employment among others. They also may experience a narrower margin of health, both because of poverty and social exclusion, and also because they may be vulnerable to secondary conditions. Evidence suggests that people with disabilities face barriers in accessing the health and rehabilitation services they need in many settings.

5.0 Education and Literacy

Educational literacy was estimated to mean those aged 10 years and above who have attained standard four and above. Table 6 shows that an estimated 60.9 percent of the Sub District population had attained standard four or above hence were said to be literate. As shown in other studies, there were more females who were literate compared to their male counterparts on a ratio of 62.5 to 59.5 percent.

Moeng had, by far, the highest percent of literate population at 93.8 percent. This is because this is a schooling facility enrolling students for senior secondary education. However, there are pockets of residents who had not attained the cut-off point of four years of schooling.

Other villages which had higher literacy rates include Palapye at 68.5 percent, Serowe at 64.6 percent, Serule at 64.5 percent, Kgagodi at 64.0 percent and Radisele at 60.2 percent.

On the other hand, the villages of Malatswai, Thabala, Dimajwe and Motshegaletau had the lowest literacy rates at 38.6 percent, 40.5 percent, 41.5 percent and 42.4 percent respectively.

5.1 Training

Regarding acquisition of training to enhance one's technical capacity, it was found that 14.9 percent of the Sub-District population had not received any training, followed by those who had completed or were currently pursuing university education at 4.7 percent and those who had completed or pursuing technical or vocational education at 3.6 percent.


Palapye and Serowe villages had the highest percent of those who had not received any training at 20.1 and 21.1 percent respectively, while Malatswai and Tshimoyapula had the lowest percent of those who had received no training. On attainment of higher education, Palapye had the highest proportion of persons who had completed university training at 7.9 percent followed by Moeng at 7.0 percent and Serowe at 5.6 percent.

6.0 Energy

6.1 Source of Fuel for Lighting

The Sub-District was assessed for access to sources of lighting which included electricity, solar power, candles, wood, paraffin and gas among others. Overall, 49.0 percent of the district households used electricity for lighting followed by those who used paraffin at 35.2 percent. Use of electricity was highest in Moeng at 78.8 percent. The village was followed by Serowe and Palapye at 60.8 and 69.8 percent respectively. Other villages with significant proportion of those who used electricity were Radisele (47.8 percent), Kgagodi (47.3 percent) and Maunatlala at 44.4 percent.

Figure 3: Principal Source of Fuel for Lighting in Serowe/Palapye Sub District 2011




The villages of Moremi, Gamabuo, Mogome and Malaka, which do not have electric supply, relied on paraffin for lighting. In addition to the two sources of energy (electricity and paraffin), a notable proportion of the district households used firewood for lighting. This was mainly in the rural and small villages. Besides the villages that were not connected to the national electric grid, there were others where electricity was available but had limited proportion of households using it for lighting. These included Majwanaadipitse (4.5 percent), Malatswai (5.1 percent) and Tshimoyapula (5.3 percent).

6.2 Source of Energy for Cooking

Cooking accounts for about 90 percent of all household energy consumption in developing countries. Worldwide, 2.5 billion people use biomass fuels for cooking. These include firewood, charcoal, dung and agricultural residues. Biomass fuels are often the only available energy source, especially in rural areas. Firewood is often burnt in open places, emitting smoke which may contaminate the atmosphere.

More than half (56 percent) of the district households used firewood for cooking, followed by those who used gas at 25.9 percent. A significant proportion of more than 90 percent (91.7) of households in Majwanaadipitse used firewood for cooking. The data shows that firewood is used more in the rural and remote areas of the district. Firewood was least used in Moeng with only 10.9 percent of the households using it.

Use of electricity as a source of cooking was low in the district. Only 16.1 percent of the district households used electricity for cooking. Moeng had the highest proportion of households using electricity for cooking at 27.9 percent followed by Palapye and Serowe at 24.7 and 20.9 percent respectively.

With a growing population, the demand for biomass fuels may far exceed sustainable supply which will lead to massive deforestation, land degradation and desertification. Additionally, the biomass fuels are mainly burnt in inefficient open fires which contribute to contamination of the atmosphere.

6.3 Source of Energy for Heating

In a home the heating system normally serves two purposes. The primary purpose of heating is to maintain warm temperatures within the home during colder months. Keeping a house warm is important for the occupants of the home as well as the structure itself. The secondary purpose of a heating system is to heat domestic hot water for usage during all months of the year.

Figure 5: Principal Source of Heating in Serowe/Palapye Sub District 2011





Figure 5 shows that firewood was the most common source of energy for heating and was used by 82 percent of the district households followed by electricity with 16.1 percent. All households in the villages of Moremi and Malaka used firewood for heating. The two villages are not connected to the national electricity grid. The second common source of heating was electricity with 16.1 percent of the district households using it. Moeng had the highest proportion of households using electricity for heating, followed by Palapye and Serowe. Diesel and biogas were the least common sources of heating for the district households.

The implications for excessive harvesting and use of firewood for heating are the same as those mentioned above in the case of cooking. These include elevated risks of deforestation, land degradation and desertification, and contamination of the environment.

7.0 Religion

A religion is defined as an organized collection of beliefs, cultural systems, and world views that relate humanity to an order of existence. Other scholars define religion as a collection of cultural systems, belief systems, and worldviews that establishes symbols that relate humanity to spirituality and, sometimes, to moral value.

Figure 6: Proportion of Serowe/Palapye Sub District by Religion 2011




Majority (70.1 percent) of the district population belonged to the Christian denomination. This group was followed by those who had no religion who constituted close to a quarter (22.3 percent) of the sub-district's population. Further, a significant 6.2 percent of the sub district's population followed ancestral beliefs (Badimo). The village of Gamabuo had the highest proportion of people of Christian denomination at 93.1 percent.

Badimo followers were mainly found in the villages of Moremi (39 percent), Mogome (32.4 percent), Lesenepole (23.2 percent) and Malatswai at 18.4 percent. Other religions such as Muslim, Bahai, Hindu and Rastafarian collectively constituted only 1.4 percent of the district population.

8.0 Marital Status

Under the Marriage Act which was amended in 2001, the legal age of marriage is 18 for both sexes, conditional on parental consent. Without parental consent, the legal age is 21. This age limit, however, does not apply to marriages contracted under customary or religious law.



However, in the 2011 Population and Housing Census, it was realized that some cultures contentiously allowed marriage at the ages of 12 years, despite the provision of the statutory instrument. More than half (55.6 percent) of the persons within this age group was never married while only 16 percent were reportedly currently married. The proportion that was currently married was highest in Malaka at 23.3 percent followed by Gootau and Matlhakola at 22.7 and 22.4 percent respectively. As expected, the village of Moeng had the lowest proportion of married persons at 4.7 percent. This is because Moeng as a predominantly schooling facility accommodates students who are not yet married. Against the background of low marriage, there is an observed high proportion of those who are cohabiting or living together (21.9 percent).

Other villages with significantly low rates of marriage include Malatswai, Mmashoro and Dimajwe at 6.7, 8.3 and 7.9 percent respectively. We should, however, note that the definition of marriage in these localities may not exactly conform to the one used in the Census. For example, some communities classify persons who are living together as married.


9.0 Orphan-hood

The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and global partners define an orphan as a child who has lost one or both parents. Evidence clearly shows that the vast majority of orphans are living with a surviving parent, grandparent, or other family member. A further 95 percent of all orphans are over the age of five.

This definition contrasts with concepts of orphan in many industrialized countries, where a child must have lost both parents to qualify as an orphan. UNICEF and numerous international organizations adopted the broader definition of orphan in the mid-1990s as the AIDS pandemic began leading to the death of millions of parents worldwide, leaving an ever increasing number of children growing up without one or more parents. So the terminology of a 'single orphan' – the loss of one parent – and a 'double orphan' – the loss of both parents – was born to convey this growing crisis.

Botswana describes an orphan as someone who is aged 16 years and has lost one or both parents. Overall, 3.2 percent of persons within this aged had lost both parents. The most common orphan-hood was having lost a father, but with mother still alive. This affected 15.6 percent of children aged 16 years and below. Moeng college was, by far, the most affected village with over half (57.8 percent) of the orphans having lost their fathers. Mogapinyana and Moiyabana also had significant proportions of orphans who had lost their fathers with 23.9 and 21.3 percent respectively.

The schooling facility of Moeng College had the highest percent of orphans who had lost both parents at 13.5 percent followed by Mogome with 5.3 percent.


10.0 Access to Drinking Water and Sanitation

As a signatory of the Millennium Declaration, Botswana is committed to achieving the Millennium Development Goals by 2015. Provision of safe portable water remains a priority for the country. To date, more than 90 percent of the country's population has access to portable water. One target of the MDGs is to reduce by half the proportion of people without sustainable access to safe drinking water and basic sanitation.

10.1 Access to Safe Drinking Water

Ninety five (95.8) percent of the Sub District households had access to piped water. Table 15 shows that he proportions ranged from the lowest of 88.0 percent for Maunatlala to the highest for Moremi, Matlhakola and Gojwane where all households had access to piped water.

10.1 Access to Improved Sanitation

Overall, 80.6 percent of households in the sub-district had access to improved methods of waste disposal, which included toilet, both flush and pit latrines. Moeng had the highest percent of households with access to sanitation at 95.8 percent followed by Gootau with 95.6 percent. On the other hand, the villages of Malatswai and Majwanaadipitse had the lowest proportion of households with access to sanitation at 25.3 and 32.7 percent respectively.




Figure 10 shows that the most common sanitation facility was the pit latrine which was used by than a third (38 percent) of the sub district households. Majority of those who used pit latrines owned such facilities. The second common facility was owned flush toilets which were used by 18.9 percent of the Sub District households.

ANNEXES

11.0 Projected Population

Between 2001 and 2011, the population of Serowe / Palapye Sub District increased by 19.2 percent, which is an increase of 29,142 inhabitants. The population grew by 1.8 percent annually between the years.

It is projected that by year 2026, the population of the Sub District will reach 225872 inhabitants which is addition of 45,372 or 25 percent increase. This is denoted in figure 11 below.


